County Court.

[Judge J. M. Love presiding.]

The grand jury yesterday evening completed its work for this term and spent nearly the entire day examining and investigating the mode of expenditure of the money levied and appropriated for the improvement of the county roads in Washington road district of Alexandria county. The grand jury brought in no presentments or indictments against any special road officer of that district, but delivered to the judge quite a lengthy report and statement criticising the manner in which contracts had been given out, setting forth that money had been paid out to parties upon road contracts when the work had been improperly done, and almost absolutely at variance with the plans and specifications of said contracts.

Judge Love received the report and explained to the foreman of the grand jury that the presentments should be more specifically stated, and that it would be impossible under those presentments for the Commonwealth's attorney to prepare indictments, and he returned the report to the grand jury. The grand jury returned to their rooms, and after an hour or so, again came into court and said that they would not, at this time, make any specific charges against any particular persons, but asked the court to have the matter further investigated. The judge then referred the report of the grand jury to Commonwealth's Attorney Clements, and directed him to lay the report before the board of supervisors of the county, who have the general control over roads. The judge further directed that the Commonwealth's attorney request the board to investigate and to make a report to him at the April term of his court, when he indicated that he would finally dispose of the matter by directing indictments to be preferred should any road money appear to have been fraudulently or unlawfully expended. The grand jury was then discharged.

Today—Com. vs. Bernard Lewis, charged with housebreaking; jury, and verdict of not guilty. Com. vs. Reason Johnson, charged with unlawfully cutting and stabbing; jury and case in progress.

Deserted Wife and Children. Archie Wilkins, about twenty-two years of age, was arrested by Officer Ferguson on King street about 8 o'clock last night on complaint of his wife, who charged him with having deserted her and their two young children earlier in the day. The family arrived at Alexandria on a ferry boat yesterday morning. The man left his wife and the children, aged one and three years, in the ferry house, stating that he would return in a short while. Several hours elapsed and he failed to appear, one of the children becoming ill in the meantime. Temporary shelter for the family was procured at the home of Mrs. Roby, on South Lee street, by sympathetic people who realized the family's predicament. Wilkins when placed under arrest denied that it was his intention to desert his family. He said that he had been working in Baltimore, but had lost his position and was trying to make his way back to Suffolk, Va., where he formerly lived. He claimed that his money gave out when he reached here and that he started out to try to raise sufficient funds to purchase two tickets for Norfolk on the steamer. Failing in that, he said, he had hoped to get enough to send his wife and children home, in which event he could walk there. The husband was kept at the station house today. A physician attended the sick child and should it prove that it is not suffering from serious indisposition the family will be returned to Washington.

Death of Former Alexandrian. John E. Lally died at his residence, 496 F street southwest, Washington, at an early hour Tuesday morning. The deceased was in the 84th year of his age. Nearly half a century ago the deceased lived in Alexandria. He conducted a stand in market and enjoyed an extensive acquaintance. About thirty years ago he removed to Washington, where he had since lived, although he made frequent visits to this city and in a measure kept up his acquaintance here, where he also cast his ballot. He was the father of Mrs. R. W. Breen. His remains will be brought here for interment tomorrow. The following incident in connection with the deceased will be remembered by many Alexandrians: At the outbreak of the Confederate war for independence Mr. Lally was employed by the firm of Waters & Zimmerman, lumber dealers, on Cameron and Union streets. The war closed their business and the senior partner offered to get Mr. Lally a position in the United States Quartermaster's Department here. "I can't take it, sir," said Mr. Lally. "Got a better place?" "No, sir, I've got nothing, but I can't leave the boys who have gone away from Alexandria to fight for their country." "You will be sorry for it," said Mr. Waters. "No, sir," answered Mr. Lally, "no man is ever sorry for his conscience." He then became a dealer in market and soon accumulated money.

River Notes. Preparations for the hatching of shad spawn at the Bryan's Point fishing station of the United States fish commission will begin early next week and the taking of spawn will begin as soon as the shad reach this part of the river in any considerable number. The large steam yacht Gretchen, owned by Mr. J. E. Reburn, of New York, is hauled out on the marine railway for some repair work to her wheel bearings and for examination of hull. She is being prepared for service during the coming season. The steam yacht Givotta, belonging to Mr. John R. Dos Passos, of New York, is lying in the stream off the foot of 10th street, Washington, being repainted and prepared for service. Her owner will make frequent trips in her to the mouth of the river during the coming summer.

The horse attached to Mr. John Henderson's wagon ran away on Queen street, between St. Asaph and Washington, early this morning. Fresh fish were scattered in every direction before the animal was stopped.

Crook, 226 south Washington street, is extremely ill. Mr. D. G. Meade, of The Plains, was in the city today on a visit to friends.

Elopers Married.

Benjamin Franklin, of Baltimore, 16-years old, who eloped with Miss Katie Pugh, aged 19 years, of the same city, were married Tuesday night in this city by Rev. Mr. Jeffers, pastor of Trinity M. E. Church. The youthful elopers are now in Washington, and will return to Baltimore at the end of this week. Tuesday Mr. Pilker, the young lady's brother-in-law, was notified by a friend that the couple was in Alexandria for the purpose of getting married. Mr. Pilker left on the next train for this city and arrived just in time to witness the ceremony. A young man by the name of G. Meads, a resident of this city, also witnessed the ceremony. The groom is a pugilist of some reputation and has fought in Philadelphia before the National Athletic Club.

Suit for Divorce.

Laura Gregg has filed in the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia a petition for the annulment of her marriage with Thomas Gregg. The complainant, who was an orphan and sixteen years of age at the time of her marriage, alleges that the defendant made a false statement concerning her age in order to secure a marriage license, and that he deserted her in 1899 after they had been married two months. Since that time she has been obliged to support herself. The defendant lives in Fauquier county.

Operations Begun.

There was animation at Fishtown today. Several banks of herring were on the platforms and the cutters were at work, while a few vessels were at the wharf. The packing houses were open and the odor characteristic of the neighborhood at this time of the year was decidedly in evidence. There are no fixed prices as yet, nor will there be for a few days. Should mild weather set in soon, which is probable, the fishing will be in full blast.

The special Lenten services at Grace Church last night were conducted by Rev. Roland Cotton Smith, rector of St. John's Episcopal Church, Washington, who preached a sermon to a large congregation which was greatly appreciated. Rev. Dr. Wm. E.
