The tug Sunbeam, which has been used by Messrs. Weand and McDonald of Washington in the building of the piers for the new Long Bridge, has been sold to Messrs. William A. Smoot & Co., of this city, and will be used to tow sand laden scows from the dredges on the river to this city and Washington.

To Advertise for Bids.

Officials of the Washington, Alexandria and Mount Vernon Railway say bids for construction of the loop around the square bounded by King, Prince, Fairfax and Royal streets will be asked in a few days, and that work on the proposed improvement will be commenced in about a month's time.

Liquor Licenses.

Judge Barley of the Corporation Court states that all applications for liquor licenses must be submitted to him before the first of May, so that they may be passed upon by that time. He will enforce the law which requires applications for licenses to be made before the first of May.

Excursion to Richmond.

The personally conducted excursion, composed of a large number of Daughters of the Confederacy and others from Washington to attend the Confederate Bazaar at Richmond, on the 18th, will stop at Alexandria for those who may wish to join it here.

Sunday School Celebrations.

The children of the Sunday schools of several of the churches held their Easter celebrations yesterday and were made happy by the awarding of prizes and premiums, and glad carols, telling of the glory of the resurrection, were chanted by sweet childish voices.

The Sunday school of Grace Church held their celebration in the morning and a large attendance was present. An interesting programme was carried out, consisting of the singing of carols and hymns and an address by the rector of the church, Rev. C. E. Ball.

At St. Paul's in the evening there was a beautiful display of flowers, a large floral cross and a cross and crown being the features. The cross and crown, the former in white and the latter of scarlet flowers, was a memorial to the late Miss Cecelia Green, and was sent by the Chapter of Praise and the teachers of the Sunday school.

In Immanuel Lutheran Church the children received, as is the custom, their first communion.
