### WORLD'S FAIR NEWS-NOTES.

Hawaii has appropriated \$50,000 to defray the expense of an exhibit at the World's Fair, St. Louis.

Work on the French National Pavilion, a reproduction of the Grand Triam at Versailles, France, will be begun soon at the World's Fair.

Live stock breeders of Canada will make a big display at the fair. They have asked for government assistance to the extent of \$250,000.

The British National Pavilion at the fair will be a reproduction of the Orangery or banquet hall of the Kensington Palace, in Kensington Gardens, London.

The World's Fair aerial tournament to be held at St. Louis next year has another entry. W. L. Tabney, of Wheeling, W. Va., has invented an airship with which he is going to compete for the \$100,000 prize.

Greece will erect a pavilion at the fair, and will also make exhibits in several of the different departments. Among the interesting things exhibited will be reproductions of old Greek statuary.

The plans for the building of the Travelers' Protective Association at the fair have been completed. The contract for the building will be let next month. The structure will be 85 by 45 feet and one story high. It will contain a large central hall which will be used for receptions during the fair.

One of the interesting exhibits that may be seen in the Horticulture Department next year, will be the fruits fresh from South Africa. The managers of fruit farms of the late Cecil Rhodes, at Capetown, have announced their intention of placing fresh fruits on exhibit each week.

A million roses will bloom at once in the vast rose garden at the fair. Four acres are set to strong and vigorous rose trees. Thirty of the largest exhibitors have sent their choicest stock and each will strive for first place in the judgment of the jury and people. This vast rose garden with its 50,000 trees lies east of the great Palace of Agriculture. It is on a high elevation overlooking the group of main buildings of the exposition. Each collection, while separate and distinct in itself, forms a part of a great and artistic whole, and a belt of beautiful green lawn, from four to eight feet wide, surrounds each collection. The work of planting the 50,000 roses already growing in this mammoth garden, the largest of its kind ever conceived, occupies the time of scores of expert gardeners and hosts of laborers.

### NEW BRIDGE AT NIAGARA.

A new bridge is projected for the Niagara gorge, and when built it will provide a crossing place for another railroad. A bill allowing the franchise to build has been introduced in the Dominion House of Commons, and the Pere Marquette Railroad has directed that its line be extended from St. Thomas, Ont., to Niagara Falls with all possible speed. At present there are four great bridges over the lower Niagara river. The one closest to the cataract is the largest steel arch in the world and affords a crossing place for trolley cars, carriages and pedestrians. About a mile down the river stands the cantilever bridge of the Michigan Central. This is a double-track structure and is of great strength. Three hundred feet below it stands the steel arch of the Grand Trunk Railway, or, rather, the steel arch that affords the Grand Trunk a crossing place, it being owned by other capital. This is a wonderful bridge, massive in every part. It has double tracks and is one of the strongest steel arches in the world. Five miles farther down the river stands the only suspension bridge now stretching over the lower Niagara. It is near Lewiston and over it extend the trolley tracks that form a link in the belt line service around the mighty gorge. While the crossing point of the proposed new structure has not yet been definitely announced, it is likely to be erected midway between the upper steel arch and the Michigan Central's cantilever, or to be carried farther down stream to a point below the Grand Trunk arch and closer to the famous whirlpool. This latter position would carry it right over the tossing, tumbling, whirling waters of the world-famed whirlpool rapids and would afford travel a wonderful view of the foam-lashed stream. The style of structure has not been indicated, but it would appear from the bridge work at Niagara in recent years and the modern engineering ideas of what a railroad bridge should be that the contemplated new bridge is likely to be another steel arch, with double tracks and strong proportions. Nature designed Niagara as the great route of travel between the East and the West, and man has not been slow in recognizing the fact.
