HICKS'S FORECASTS FOR JUNE.

The first storm period is central on the 4th, covering the 2nd to 6th. High degrees of humidity, high temperature, and very low barometer, on and next to the 3rd, will prove certain harbingers of severe storms. If actual storms are delayed, even up to the 5th or 6th, do not be thrown off your guard until the indications culminate. Vicious thunder storms, accompanied with hail and possibly tornado centers, are among the things reasonably to be expected at this period. Some very cool nights are sure to result when the storms are over.
On and touching the 9th and 10th, look for reaction to storm conditions—change to much warmer, falling barometer and more storms of rain, thunder, and heavy squalls of wind. The regular summer solstice disturbances will set in at this time, making June showers probable almost any afternoon and evening.
The regular storm period, covering the 14th to the 19th, will reach its culminating stages about Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, the 17th, 18th and 19th.
On and touching the 21st and 22nd, look for the return of storm conditions, with renewed thunder and rain squalls, and much harmless lightning at night. Most sections will have sufficient rains at this and other June periods. The last week in June is covered by a combined Mercury and Vulcan storm period. About the 25th it will turn exceedingly warm, the barometer will fall and persistent cloudiness and frequent storms of wide extent and much energy will mark the closing days of the month.

ARREST OF ALLEGED SPY.—

A sensation has been caused by the arrest at Nancy, France, on Wednesday last, of a man named Balguet on a charge of espionage. He is accused of having sold French military secrets to Germany and of having been regularly in German pay. The irony of the situation is that Balguet gave information to the French government on the subject of German military matters and received money for his services only a few days before his arrest. His position in the secret service appears to have given him access documents of an important character. When they disappeared from official quarters in Paris suspicion fell upon him and his movements were watched. His frequent journeys to Strasburg attracted attention. It seems, however, that direct proof of his guilt was furnished by an army contractor, to whom Balguet confessed the nature of his occupation. The contractor set a trap for him, and when Balguet asked for details as to the defenses of a fort in the neighborhood he drew him on to put his inquiries into writing. The contractor then exposed Balguet to the authorities. The wife of the alleged spy was arrested last week at Lyons. In the opinion of the police she was the intermediary between her husband and the German authorities, her frequent railway journeys giving color to the supposition. Balguet's home has been searched, and it is said a number of compromising papers have been seized, including some stolen from Paris. The presumed spy is a man of middle age.

A MOTHER ATTEMPTS SUICIDE.—

What came very near being a tragedy occurred at the home of G. W. Lindsay in Fredericksburg, Thursday night, and, as it was, Mrs. Lindsay is at the Mary Washington Hospital suffering from the effects of wounds inflicted in an effort to end her life. She had been for some time suffering from severe mental depression. She and her four daughters—Mary, Olivia, Margaret and Ruth—died together, as usual, Mr. Lindsay being at work in Stafford county, and at dinner each of the girls drank lemonade, as did their mother. A short time afterwards all were taken violently ill, and the illness was accompanied by vomiting, which probably saved the lives of all who drank the lemonade, as there is a strong probability that Mrs. Lindsay, in a moment of temporary aberration, placed some kind of poison in the beverage. At 6 o'clock all of the children were much better, but the climax came when Mrs. Lindsay, still in an unbalanced frame of mind, attempted to kill herself with an axe. The woman cut three or four gashes in the top and side of her head with the axe, and it was only the prompt arrival of Dr. Barney and Dr. Martin which saved her life. They found her lying in a pool of blood.




