The temperature underwent a decided change on Saturday night, the northeast wind and rain causing a marked fall of the mercury in the thermometer.

Memorial Day at Fairfax.

Appropriate memorial exercises were held at Fairfax on Saturday. Speeches were made in the courthouse by Mr. Robert E. Lee, jr., of Ravensworth, and Rev. Everard Meade, rector of Pohick Church, after which the assembled people repaired to Fairfax Cemetery and decked with flowers the mound under which are buried the Confederate dead.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

Blue June. The good old summer time. The first day of the first summer month. The Relief Truck is out of service during some minor repairs. The Lady Macabees will hold a meeting in their hall tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock. Mayor Simpson this morning disposed of several unimportant cases in the Police Court. The Woman's Auxiliary will meet at Confederate Hall, No. 806 Prince street, tomorrow evening at 3 o'clock. The employees at the Washington and Ohio Railroad platform in this city will be paid off weekly instead of monthly. There was an alarm of fire about ten o'clock this morning. The alarm came from the first district, but no one was able to ascertain what caused it. The steamer C. J. Saffier, the tugboat Martin Belmont, the sloop Daniel Sheets and the longboat Mayflower are at the wharves undergoing repairs. The Columbia Fire Company today filed with the clerk of the Corporation Court the list of members of the company—51 in number. The filing of the list was ordered under the impression that active firemen are exempt from jury duty but they are not! White Sunday was observed yesterday with appropriate services in the Catholic, Episcopal and Lutheran Churches. The services in these and the other city churches were conducted in accordance with Saturday's announcements. There being about \$10,000 now available for school buildings in Arlington district in the county, and it being declared that the village of Arlington proposed to spend it all for a school in that vicinity, the citizens of Fort Myer Heights brought suit for an injunction, to compel the board of school trustees to divide the funds between the two places. It was alleged that Fort Myer Heights is very much in need of a school building. Judge Nicol granted a restraining order, returnable before him at Manassas June 20. OFFICIAL TO THE OWNERS OF DOGS!

Mayor's Office, Alexandria, Va., June 1, 1903. All persons owning or intending to keep any animal of the Dog or Canine species must come forward on or before JUNE FIFTEENTH, 1903, and take out a license for the same from the Auditor. Any person owning or intending to keep any animal of the Dog or Canine species without the required license will be fined (as the laws on the subject require) \$5 for every Dog so owned or harbored. Complaint has been frequently made that many persons fail to take out their licenses, and that others pay on one or two Dogs when owning and harboring more, or who send such dogs away during the summer months and bring them back in the fall. My attention has been called to this violation of the law, and I shall require the policemen to report all such cases, and fines will be imposed upon those who fail to take out licenses. The police officers will be required to report all violations of this law. In order to avoid any mistakes persons who make application for license would do well to write their names and number of residence, street, &c., on a card or paper. GEORGE L. SIMPSON, Mayor.
