AFTER THE PENNSYLVANIA.

A dispatch from New York says the statement is made on the best of authority that an offer has been made to the syndicate which has agreed to underwrite the \$75,000,000 new Pennsylvania Railroad stock at 120 by a very important financial interest to take over any part or all of the stock that may come into the syndicate's possession. In fact, it is asserted that this financial interest is ready to take all the new stock. It is intimated that with its present holdings the possession of the new stock would probably carry control of the potential property. The identity of the interest which seeks control of the Pennsylvania is not disclosed, but rumor has for some time attributed such a desire to a group of very powerful financiers, including the Rockefeller-Gould interests in combination. It is further stated that the proposed purchasers have offered to take the stock at a fixed percentage over the syndicate price. The possibilities of such a deal—change of Pennsylvania control—have been frequently discussed lately in Wall Street, where it is thought that a return of normal conditions will reveal some very decided changes in railroad ownership. It has been suggested that the acquisition of an influential voice in Pennsylvania by Rockefeller-Gould interests would put an end to the strained relations that have so long existed between the most important railroad interests in the country, inasmuch as it would give the Goulds a much-desired outlet to the Atlantic seaboard, more particularly to New York, and would otherwise adjust a number of difficulties which have for a long time obstructed the furtherance of the "community of interests" policy.

FRANCE AND THE VATICAN.—The negotiations between the Vatican and France regarding the attitude to be assumed by President Loubet toward the Pope during the President's coming visit to Rome are at a standstill. The Vatican hopes a change will occur by France modifying the situation. If no change takes place the idea prevails that M. Loubet will not ask to see the Pope, thus avoiding a rupture between France and the Vatican. The authorities believe that by M. Loubet and the Pope ignoring each other the present status of the relations between the church and the French republic will be maintained. The Pope yesterday received 300 pilgrims who are returning to their homes from the Holy Land. They were mostly French. The audience lasted twenty minutes. Only a dozen of the leaders of the pilgrimage were permitted to kiss the hand of the Pope, who addressed a few words to them and gave the apostolic benediction to all. The Pontiff urged the French pilgrims to "pray fervently for dear France, which needs it so much." A dispatch to the Paris Temps from Rome says that the Pope's reception to the French pilgrims yesterday was due to the fear of the Vatican authorities that his failure to receive them would cause exaggerated reports of his ill health. The correspondent adds that the Pontiff is certainly weakening, but he says the Pope continues on foot, directs the affairs of the church with his accustomed clearness of mind, and yesterday discussed the affairs of the Oriental missions with Mgr. Savelli.

CONTRACTS FOR BATTLESHIPS.—Secretary of the Navy Moody yesterday afternoon announced that he had awarded the contracts for the construction of the three 16,000-ton battleships—"the Minnesota," the Kansas and the Vermont"—to the Newport News Shipbuilding Company, of Newport News, Va.; the Fore River Shipbuilding Company, of Quincy, Mass., and the New York Shipbuilding Company, of Camden, N. J., respectively. The bids of the three successful concerns were: Newport News Company, \$4,110,000; New York Shipbuilding Company, \$4,164,000; Fore River Company, \$4,179,000. Bids were also submitted by the Wilbur Cramp & Sons' Shipbuilding Company and the United States Shipbuilding Company. The delay in awarding the bids was due to the fact that the bids were greatly in excess of the last bids on battleships of the Louisiana type, which are similar to these vessels, and it was feared the ships could not be completed after the expense of equipment was taken into consideration for \$4,212,000, the limit of cost set by Congress for their hulls and machinery. It has been decided, however, that Congress did not intend that any of the "equipment" of the vessels, which includes such things as furniture, boats, etc., should be taken into consideration in the price set in the authorizing the ships.

FOR ACTION ON THE CANAL.—Important conferences have been held lately between Secretary Hay and persons connected with the Panama canal enterprise, the outcome of which is a decision to promptly terminate the negotiation with Colombia one way or the other. The report is that some from Colombia respecting the outlook for the ratification of the treaty are conflicting. One day it is stated that the opposition has mustered sufficient force to prevent ratification, and the next day the department is told the chances for the treaty have brightened. Secretary Hay has awaited the return to Washington of President Roosevelt before taking any decided steps, but he is now in a position to act. The President's patience is well nigh exhausted, and the Colombian Government is to be made aware of the fact. On June 20 the Colombia congress will convene, and its proceedings will be watched with the greatest interest here. If it shows an earnest purpose to consider the treaty, a due allowance of time will be made by
