THE COMING WAR.

Although no formal replies have been received to the Bulgarian government's note, it is stated that the representatives of three great powers have repeated their counsels to Bulgaria to remain quiet, as in the event of a war with Turkey Bulgaria need not expect any help in foreign quarters. It is further reported that the same diplomats visited General Petroff and endeavored to persuade him to postpone the mobilization of Bulgarian forces but the Premier declined.

One of the ministerial organs in Sofia in an editorial on the government's note says it hopes it will be the last time that the Bulgarian government will issue a note. If the powers do not intervene to restore order in Macedonia Bulgaria will undertake with the feeble forces she possesses to do what is expected to her, and give Europe the pleasure of witnessing a bloody drama in Macedonia.

A telegram from Burgas reports that a general massacre is beginning throughout the district of Losengrad. Turkish troops and bashi-bazouks attacked a Greek village near Losengrad, killed 25 peasants and destroyed the church, schools and many houses. The Turks attacked the village of Paulevo and killed everybody they found on the streets. A fight is reported from Petchonitza between a band of 100 insurgents and 300 Turks. The insurgents, who occupied a strong position, fired on the attacking Turks, killing 25.

A telegram from Uskub says the mobilization of the Turkish army is proceeding rapidly, whilst dispatches from Constantinople assert that the military party is urging the Sultan to order his troops to cross the Bulgarian frontier without a declaration of war, which the party regards as unnecessary, inasmuch as Bulgaria is a vassal state of Turkey. The Sultan is said to be still hesitating.

The Feast of the Cross passed off without disturbance at Beirut. Contrary to the official reports, advices from good sources say the Macedonian insurgents are holding their own at several points and are inflicting defeats on the Turks in the districts of Morihova and Meirik, 65 miles from Salonica, where the Turkish battalions have almost been annihilated.

The local authorities at Monastir are seeking to prevent the foreign consuls and correspondents from leaving the town under the allegation that their lives will be endangered.

WORLD'S FAIR NOTES.

California will make an exhibit of the sardine industry in the Fisheries Department at the World's Fair at St. Louis that will rival anything that can be made by France.

The plans for Ceylon's national pavilion for the fair have been finished and the work of erecting the structure will begin at once.

The largest piece of staff ever moulded is the cartouche over the main entrance to the Palace of Agriculture at the fair. It is 34 feet wide and 47 feet high. It weighs 18 tons.

The California World's Fair Commission has prepared 1,000 jars of fruit for exhibition. The glass jars vary in capacity from one to eight gallons. Two mammoth silos have been built on the ground devoted to live stock at the fair. The silos are now being filled and the ensilage will be fed to the cows participating in the dairy demonstrations next year. The silos are built of California redwood.

The central feature of Nevada's exhibit in the Palace of Mines and Metallurgy at the fair will be a huge column showing the exact amount of silver and gold produced by Nevada mines during the past 50 years. The amount reaches the startling figure of \$1,200,000,000.

HAS APPENDICITIS.—Sir Thomas Lipton is suffering from "colitis and catarrhal appendicitis," according to an official statement made by his physicians in Chicago yesterday afternoon. Sir Thomas complained of a pain in his stomach Tuesday morning when he arrived in Chicago to be the guest of Alexander H. Revell and incidentally to look after his business interests in Chicago. A few hours later he was compelled to take to his bed in his apartments at the Auditorium Annex. Tuesday night the physicians held a consultation and it was decided that the patient must remain indoors for a few days at least. The few social engagements which had been prepared for him were cancelled. Yesterday morning word came back from the sickroom that the patient was suffering acute pain, and another consultation of the physicians was called. A thorough examination was made and the case diagnosed as appendicitis. It was announced, however, that the condition of the patient was "satisfactory." No positive decision had been reached as to whether or not it would be necessary to perform an operation, but the opinion of the doctors was that the probabilities are against the necessity of such a step.
