### TREATY CONCLUDED.

It was learned in authoritative quarters in Paris yesterday evening that the terms of the general treaty of arbitration between France and Great Britain have been concluded between Foreign Minister Delcasse and the authorities in London. All the substantial features of the treaty have now been settled. The formalities are so far advanced that the treaty is considered to be an accomplished fact. The treaty follows the general lines of the Hay-Pauncefote arbitration treaty, which to a considerable extent served as a model. It is pointed out that the Hay-Pauncefote treaty, although rejected by the United States, now serves the useful purpose of giving a basis for this important Anglo-French treaty. The officials also view the negotiations as evidence of the sympathetic attitude of the United States, France and Great Britain on the practical adoption of the treaty of arbitration. The treaty is mainly significant in being the culmination of the rapprochement between France and Great Britain after centuries of warfare, the maintenance of defensive armaments and the recent animosities growing out of the Fashoda incident and the South African war. It is also significant of the tendency toward a rearrangement of the European political alliances. The treaty is mainly the outcome of the exchange of visits between King Edward and President Loubet and the visit of Baron d'Estournelles de Constant and the French parliamentarians to London. French feelings, heretofore, has been rather sceptical over the practical realization of the treaty, and when its advanced stage is known it will occasion widespread attention and discussion in France and throughout the rest of Europe.

**JUMPED FROM STEAMER.**—The mystery surrounding the disappearance of Sampson H. Levy in New York was cleared up last night, when Detective Heidelberg received a telegram which stated that Mr. Levy had committed suicide by jumping from the Fall River liner Puritan. Mr. Levy was an insurance solicitor for the New York Life Insurance Company, was prosperous and bore a striking resemblance to Admiral Dewey. He left home Saturday afternoon and when a search was made for him he was traced to the Fall River liner Puritan, which left for Boston last Saturday, said that Mr. Levy had been a passenger on the steamer. "He got a drink from me," said the barkeeper. "Mr. Levy, whom I knew well, presented a check, but I did not have the change, so he did not pay for the drink." About 10 o'clock that evening, while the Puritan was in the neighborhood of New Haven, the cry of "Man overboard!" was raised. The deck hands had seen a passenger rush from the cabin to the railing and jump into the sound. For nearly two hours the steamer circled around the spot where the passenger had disappeared. Two powerful searchlights were played about on the waters, but no trace could be found of the passenger. The two deck hands recognized the picture of Mr. Levy as that of the man they had seen commit suicide.

**JUMPED FROM TRAIN.**—Wesley Hedges, traveling on a Big Four train, accompanied by his wife and three children, en route from Jacksonville, Fla., to La Harpe, Ill., suddenly became deranged while on the train, and after arriving at Crawfordville, Ind., held the police at bay for a long time. While the train was running fifty miles an hour, Hedges suddenly gave a wild scream, and seizing one of his children plunged through the window into the darkness. His wife grabbed the boy just as the man disappeared. The trainmen stopped the train, and with the assistance of the passengers a torchlight search along the track was made. The searchers soon came upon Hedges lying near a telegraph pole. He was picked up for dead and placed in the baggage car and taken to Crawfordville. Shortly after arriving there he began to show signs of life. Left in the station, unguarded, Hedges again became violent and sprang out of the station and ran down the street, pursued by the entire police force. With large stones which he picked up he kept his pursuers at bay. He was finally overpowered and taken to jail.

**FATHER AT THE AGE OF EIGHTY.**—The announcement is made in the London papers that Lady Donegal has given birth to a son. The fifth and present Marquis of Donegal was born in 1822. He married in 1865, but his wife died in 1901, leaving no child, and their heir presumptive to the title was Lord Henry Fitzwarren Chichester, brother of the aged marquis. It has long been an open secret that the marquis and his heir are not on the best of terms. There was surprise when, a little over a year ago, the announcement was made that the marquis had contracted a second marriage. Considering Lord Donegal's age, his brother's chances of not succeeding to the title were only slightly affected by the Marquis's second marriage. Now, however, the Marquis of Donegal is the proud father of a son, and with the advent of a direct heir Lord Henry Fitzwarren Chichester ceases to be the heir presumptive.
