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FEDERATION OF LABOR.

A warning to capital against cutting wages, if financial depression comes, by President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, and a plea for harmony between employers and toilers by Senator Hanna, were made at the closing session of the National Civic Federation conference in Chicago Saturday. Mr. Gompers had listened to the arguments of the representatives of capital and labor who had come from various parts of the country to discuss questions that would aid in bringing them closer together. It was in reply to one of the speakers, the editor of New York paper, who at the occasion the day before took occasion to tell the employers and employees in the event of a possible financial reaction not to make any unreasonable demands on the employers, Mr. Gompers spoke of the harm that would follow any attempt to lower wages. Successful arbitration, Mr. Gompers said, was impracticable unless the employers are strong and workmen organized and prepared to defend the stand they may take. He spoke against the "open shop" and compared the "closed" shop to various organizations, societies and professions which he said bar persons objectionable to them. Mr. Gompers took exception to the coupling of the term boycott and bludgeon as weapons of labor which were mentioned by a speaker Friday. "It may sound," he said "very nicely as an alliteration, but as a matter of fact it does not exist. Boycott, yes; why of course we boycott, certainly. I take it that there are some ladies and gentlemen in this hall today who would disavow that they ever boycotted, but they did all the same, and they do, socially, financially and in a business way, and in every other way that is right, proper and moral. We propose to stand by our friends, help our friends in preference to those who have always their hands raised against us."

Senator Hanna advised conservatism in all disputes between both sides and praised the element of labor organizations. The work of the federation is, said Senator Hanna, a work of education, and he added that patience is required in the work for the good of our fellow men individually and for society as a whole. Future success in maintaining industrial supremacy was a greater matter than the question of who is to be the next President. Distrust preached by labor leaders, he declared to be an unfair proposition. There is not, he said, any real difference that cannot be settled, but fair dealing was necessary. He referred to the wastefulness of strikes and lockouts, and the effect they had on capital and labor, and how aid in the movement of the federation could help all. After the business session of the day a banquet at which Senator Hanna, President Gompers, members of the federation, leading business men and labor leaders were present was held.

WORK STOPPED.

Charles M. Schwab announced last year that he would build for the poor children of New York city a place where they could go for a day's outing and enjoy it with all the advantages of the most luxurious seaside resorts. He purchased a plot containing 65 acres, with a lake, which he called Arbutus Lake, on Staten Island, and there on the borders of the lake proceeded to erect buildings which contemplated the outlay of \$1,000,000. Work was begun on June 5, 1902, and half a million dollars would be a conservative estimate of the amount spent upon the project so far. On Thursday, October 8, John Donlan, the superintendent, received verbal notification from the general manager of the institution that he had received instructions to discontinue his services and with the services of all the men under him, and that hereafter Mr. Schwab's magnificent charity would be under the care of a night watchman and a caretaker until such time as it was deemed advisable to resume building and grading operations.

The main building is practically completed. So is the bathing pavilion, a beautiful piece of architecture which, it is estimated, did not cost less than \$100,000. The pier is almost practically completed.

When the work was being pushed rapidly Superintendent Donlan had as many as 250 men working for him, but this number had gradually dwindled down until Thursday, when the dismissal came, there were only 15 men upon the pay-roll.

Mr. Schwab saves about \$2,000 a month by discontinuing work. The buildings are all paid for. They were done under contract and the payments have all been met.

"I received notification," said Superintendent Donlan finished this year and that work could be just as well today, "that my services would not be required after a certain date, also orders to dismiss my men. There was no reason given except an intimation that the place could not be suspended until the spring.

When Schwab returned from Europe and placed himself in the care of Dr. Stengel, of Philadelphia, one of the Doctor's first demands was that he get out of many things that were racking his nerves. One by one Mr. Schwab has either dropped certain matters entirely or laid them by temporarily. A friend of his says that his project was as near completion that it could as well rest until the spring.
