Steam Launch Sold.

The large steam launch Runaway, belonging to Capt. Henry Davis, of Washington, has, it is stated, been sold to Mr. Joseph Moore of this city, who will put the boat in condition for service at once. The Runaway, which was formerly in the service of the army engineers at Baltimore, was purchased several weeks ago by Captain Davis, who purposed to have the vessel thoroughly overhauled, but before any work was done she was purchased by Mr. Moore. The Runaway will be taken to W. S. Moore & Sons' machine shop at this place where the work on her will be done. She will be in readiness for service in the early spring. The launch is one of the largest on the river, and can carry twenty-five or more persons without crowding.

Harbingers of Winter.

The fall in the temperature on Thursday night, the northwest wind which followed, the snow flurries of yesterday and the forging of ice last night bring to mind the fact that Indian summer is no more and that winter is drawing near. While conditions today have not been as frigid as those of yesterday, the keen northwest wind has forced most persons into overcoats and the glowing grate is again a cheerful adjunct to indoor comfort.

Smallpox in Fairfax.

Hilary Harrison, living near Gambrell postoffice, Fairfax county, is suffering from smallpox. Harrison imprudently visited the quarters of a colored man (laborer on the Southern Railway) who is suffering from the disease, and contracted it himself. There is some apprehension among people living in the neighborhood as to the probability of the disease spreading.

Negro Man in the House.

A young mulatto man entered the residence of Mrs. Kate Makley, on Henry street, between Wolfe and Wilkes, between seven and eight o'clock last night. One of Mrs. Makley's daughters took hold of the intruder and attempted to detain him until an officer could be summoned, but the negro broke away from her and ran out of the house.

Another Wreck.

There was a head-on collision shortly before eight o'clock last night between a north-bound double-header freight train of the C. & O. R. R. and a single-header south-bound southern freight train

at Sideburn, in Fairfax county, a short distance southwest of this city. Three locomotives were virtually demolished and two freight cars smashed. One of the trains was a double-header and the other was drawn by a single locomotive. But one person was hurt—a fireman of one of the engines—and he only slightly. The track was not cleared until about one o'clock this morning. For several hours passenger trains were held up on both sides of the wreck. A new depot building has recently been erected at Sideburn—a structure superior to the station in this city—and passengers and members of the crews of the wrecked trains attempted to enter it for shelter. They found it locked, however, and minus a stove. In the meantime the north wind was moaning through the trees and ice forming in the brooks. Some combustibles were gathered and a fire started which was fed by railway ties until the track was cleared and the trains allowed to move.

A Distressing Accident.

Mr. Joseph Ellis, living on south Washington street, was the victim of a serious accident last evening while on his way home from a gunning trip in lower Fairfax county. He had just passed over Hunting creek bridge and was proceeding along the north causeway with his double-barrel gun on his shoulder. He was holding the firearm at an angle of about forty-five degrees when it was suddenly converted into two pieces, by a pin which holds the barrels to the stock working loose and falling out. The stock fell behind Mr. Ellis and the barrels in front of him. The latter struck a stone in the road which discharged the contents of both chambers into Mr. Ellis's right leg, shattering the bone and making a terrible wound. A young man who was with him at the time succeeded in procuring assistance and the wounded man was conveyed to the Alexandria Hospital. Dr. Purvis soon appeared and made an examination. There was but one way in which to save the unfortunate man's life and that was to amputate the shattered limb and the doctor, assisted by Drs. Smith and Delaney, took the leg off at the knee. Mr. Ellis was resting easy today. The accident was peculiar and one not to have been anticipated.

The Market.

The attendance of country people in market this morning showed a falling off compared with previous Saturdays, and buyers were not so numerous. The supply of country produce, however, was about equal to the demand. Butter sold at 25c to 28c a pound and eggs at 30c per dozen. Prices of other articles were virtually unchanged.
