FIRE ON TORPEDO BOAT DESTROYER.

The heroism of Lieut. Curtin and several seamen on board the torpedo boat destroyer Lawrence at the Norfolk navy yard yesterday saved that craft from destruction and probably prevented the entire flotilla being blown to atoms. The carelessness of a workman, who left a lighted candle on a wooden box in the vessel's forward compartment, caused a fire that destroyed much of the Lawrence's woodwork before it was extinguished by Lieut. Curtin and some seamen just before the flames reached the magazine in which a great quantity of dynamite was stored. In their desperate battle with the flames Lieut. Curtin and his men were so overcome by the smoke that they lost consciousness after the fight was won, and were hurried on board the cruiser Olympia for treatment. Their condition is not serious. The fire occurred in a stuffy compartment, directly adjoining the magazine, and had gained considerable headway when it was discovered. The place was filled with a dense smoke that baffled the efforts of the crew and caused them to fall helpless to the steel floor. Time and again Lieut. Curtin plunged into the fire chamber and emerged with the unconscious form of a seaman in his grasp. After a hurried resuscitation the sailor and his officer would return to the fight, only to again succumb to the smoke. Finally the flames were extinguished and then the lieutenant was missed. A sailor plunged into the compartment and a second later darted out with the limp body of the officer in his arms. Five seamen in a similar condition, were stretched out on deck. All were hurried aboard the Olympia in dry dock, and the yard surgeon soon brought them to consciousness. The damage to the Lawrence was trifling, but had the flames reached the magazine the result would have been appalling.

THE FEDERATION AND "OPEN SHOP."

At yesterday's session of the American Federation of Labor in Boston, the committee on resolutions made a partial report. The resolution offered by James Wilson, of the Pattern Makers League of North America, which recommended that all the affiliated bodies pay at least 25 cents per week dues was adopted. The resolution offered by G. A. Hohen, of St. Louis, on the famous Miller case, and covering the "open shop" question, was then taken up. It recites that the federation holds the open shop to belong to the same category as the non-union or "scab" shop, and that it cannot be recognized by organized labor and that this applies to the open shop under private management as well as the open shop under government or public management. It was recommended by the committee that the resolution be referred back to the committee on resolutions, and the recommendation after some discussion was adopted. Mr. Hohen made a somewhat impassioned speech on the question of reference, saying the question of the open shop was a most important one, and he thought it had not been treated properly either in the report of President Gompers or the executive council. He said he could see no reason why a "scab" shop run by President Roosevelt is any better than a similar one run by President Parry, of the Manufacturers' Association.

JUDGMENT SUSTAINED.—The Appellate division at Albany, N. Y., has sustained the judgment obtained by Miss Frances Pettit, who was awarded a verdict for \$3,000 for 1,236 kisses. The case comes from Galway, Saratoga county, where a blacksmith named Tittlemore courted Miss Pettit for fourteen years, during which time she says he kissed her 1,236 times. She says she kept an accurate account of the number in her diary. Tittlemore finally withdrew his attentions and Miss Pettit brought suit for \$50,000, for breach of promise. The trial judge, however, awarded her a verdict of \$3,000 or \$2.37 a kiss. After he lost the case Tittlemore went into voluntary bankruptcy.

UNIQUE APPEAL.—Several shipping companies, it is announced, will shortly ask the High court at Berlin to quash, as null and void, the recent decree of Emperor William that the navy and mercantile marine use exclusively the words starboard and port, and prohibit the use of the unnautical words "right" and "left," when issuing commands. The words right and left are commonly used in the German mercantile service and the companies contend that an alteration of the customary words would cause accidents. They dispute the emperor's right to issue the decree.

FAMOUS HOUSE.—To make room for modern improvements, the old log house occupied by General Zachary Taylor (father of Mrs. Bettie Dandridge, of this city) when he was commander of the post at Fort Worth, Texas, in 1847, will be sold for firewood by the Sisters of Me-

1,000 GLASSBLOWERS IDLE.—Thrown out of employment by the installation of glassblowing machines in the Jeannette plant of the American Window Glass Company, at Greensburg, Pa., a half hundred blowers of Jeannette, with their full complement of gatherers, flatteners and cutters, are organizing a company to build a co-operative plant at a cost of \$100,000. Bonuses have been offered by Greensburg and Jeannette. Over 1,000 men were thrown out of employment by the machines in Jeannette and barely half of them have been able to get positions in the co-operative plants of western Pennsylvania and Ohio.

ACT OF JEALOUS MAN.—Seven gashes on the forehead and cheeks of Miss Nellie Battice, inflicted in Chicago Wednesday with a razor by her former sweetheart, August Enk, followed the man's declaration, "If I cannot have you, no one else shall want you. Other men will not find your face so pretty when I get through with you," asserted the man as he threw down the weapon he had used and fled, leaving the girl bleeding and helpless. Miss Battice will be disfigured for life. Jealousy, according to the police, was the cause of the attack. Enk has not been arrested.
