DOWNFALL OF "ZION."
Financial difficulties which began during the crusade of John Alexander Dowie, the self-styled "Elijah III.," and his "Restoration Host" to New York a month ago, and which have been rapidly increasing since Dowie's return, culminated last night in the Federal Court in Chicago taking possession of all the property controlled by Dowie in Zion City, Ill.

This town, which was founded two years ago by Dowie, had a population of over 10,000, is the general headquarters for Dowie's church and is said to represent an expenditure of \$20,000,000.

Fred M. Blount, cashier of the Chicago National Bank, and Albert D. Currier, a law partner of Congressman Boutwell, were appointed receivers of the property. Their bonds were fixed at \$100,000 by Judge Kohlsaat, of the United States District Court, who made the appointment on the petition of several creditors.

The receivers, with their attorneys and Custodian Redieske, with six deputy marshals, went out to Zion City last night to serve upon Dowie the notice of the receivership. Redieske and his deputies went to the bank, while the others called upon Dowie at his residence. As the officers were about to demand admission to the bank a man ran from a rear door. One of the deputies overtook him, and a second man came running from the bank: "Let me have those papers; I will get away with them."

Redieske threatened to place them under arrest unless they returned at once to the bank, which they did. He then put the bank and the three men in it under a guard.

While this was taking place at the bank the receivers and their attorneys called on Dowie and read to him the petition and order of court which placed Zion in the hands of a receiver.

The bankruptcy proceedings against Dowie were based on the allegation that he is insolvent and that while in this financial condition he committed an act of bankruptcy by making a preferential payment on November 2 to the E. S. Streeter Lumber Company for \$3,775. Dowie had been hard pressed by his creditors especially since it was announced that his recent mission to New York had proved unsuccessful financially.

Dowie is known to have accumulated a large sum as the head of the Christian Catholic Church, the assets of the organization being estimated at between \$20,000,000 and \$30,000,000. There was a large outlay of money, however, when Zion City was started. Then lace and candy industries were started, and as both of these ventures have never been a paying investment a great deal more money was tied up. Dowie's differences with his brother-in-law, Stevenson, over the management of the lace factory cost more than \$100,000, and other suits recently begun in Lake county by creditors are said to aggregate a large sum.

When Dowie's wife and son sailed from Boston on October 24 on the Cunard line steamer Saxonia for Liverpool, whence they were to go to Australia, a heavy iron box was carried to Mrs. Dowie's stateroom and carefully guarded until the steamer sailed. Dozens of Dowie's followers gathered about the ship's decks for an hour before she left the dock, but they were not permitted to go near the box. Two stewards who carried it from the Dowie carriage to the stateroom were followed by Pinkerton detectives, and when the box had been deposited in a corner closet by Dowie, the detectives were told to permit no one to enter the room. "Is it true that there is gold in that box?" asked a reporter. "Peace be with thee," was Dowie's reply, and then he gave the detectives and stewards an order to drive the reporters to another part of the ship. Officers of the Saxonia say that when the ship reached Liverpool the box was carried to a carriage in which Mrs. Dowie and her son, Gladstone Dowie, rode, while another carriage conveyed the rest of the baggage to a hotel. Mrs. Dowie and her son both denied that the box contained gold and securities to the value of \$7,500,000.

John Alexander Dowie is the most remarkable of all the faith healers' prophets or "Messiahs" who have pushed to the rescue of a sinful world in the last half century. He calls himself Elijah the Restorer, and he claims to be the reincarnation of Elijah the Prophet—or, to be more exact, the third reincarnation, for the first Elijah was caught up to heaven in a whirlwind, and the second, John the Baptist, was beheaded. He is remarkable, first, for the size of the fortune he is said to have accumulated, which, it has been said, amounts to \$15,000,000, made in ten years on a capital at the start of nothing. He is remarkable for the number of his followers, and for his hold upon them. No fewer than 100,000 persons, scattered throughout the world, profess faith in Dowie. But the most remarkable of all is the method by which he has accomplished this. Starting in an obscure, penniless faith healer, in a little cottage on the South Side in Chicago, ten years ago, he began preaching to a little band in a cheap hall. Soon he had enough of a following and enough contributions to be able to hire the Auditorium, Chicago's largest and handsomest theatre, for his Sunday services. He has been holding meetings there ever since, haranguing crowds of 5,000 people at every meeting. His harangues are made up chiefly of wild ravings against the Roman Catholic Church, the Free-

It seems incredible that a frenzied tirade against newspapers—"the viper press," Dowie calls them—should make a man give up his money to him, but it does. His latest exploit was his descent upon New York with his Restoration Host, by which he expected to accomplish great things for Zion. New York, however, refused to take him seriously and literally laughed him out of the city. The crusade was a dismal failure, as far as any result other than the amusement of the people of the metropolis was concerned, for his meetings in Madison Square Garden were regarded as "the best show in town" as long as they lasted. Bitter and disgusted, Dowie returned with his hungry hosts to Zion. Since then a number of suits has been entered against him and judgments secured.
