### ALEXANDRETTA INCIDENT.

As was stated yesterday, the United States flag over the consulate at Alexandretta, Asiatic Turkey, has been hauled down and Consul Davis has left his post for Beirut in consequence of a serious diplomatic incident, during which Mr. Davis was insulted and assaulted by the local police. The affair grew out of the arrest of an Armenian—Ohannes Attarian, a naturalized American citizen. Attarian had been in prison at Aleppo during the last two months and had just been liberated through the intervention of the American consular agent on condition of his leaving the country forthwith. Mr. Davis was accompanying Attarian on board a departing steamer, when the police intercepted the party, assaulted and insulted Mr. Davis and, despite the resistance of the Consul and his attendant guards, rearrested Attarian and took him back to prison.

Mr. Davis immediately lowered the flag over the consulate and formally broke off relations with the Turkish authorities by quitting Alexandretta, leaving the consulate in charge of the vice consul. A mob of Moslems seized on the occasion to make a hostile demonstration against the consulate and against the Christians generally.

The local authorities assert that Mr. Davis struck the police with a cane, and that after the rearrest of Attarian the consular cavasses (military couriers) attempted to rescue him, and that in the fracas which ensued the cavasses broke the windows of the prison.

The Turkish authorities further claim that Attarian, who is a native of Diarbakir, Asiatic Turkey, has been traveling about the country with an illegal passport. They also point out that the question of Armenians naturalized in America returning to Turkey has always been a source of trouble, since the Porte invariably refuses to recognize naturalization. When Attarian was arrested, \$2,500 was found in his pocket. This, it is believed, may have contributed to his arrest, the Turks suspecting him of being a revolutionist.

The matter is engaging the energetic attention of the United States Legation at Constantinople. Minister Leishman has made urgent representations to the Porte, and is now awaiting a fuller report before taking further steps.

### AFFAIR ON ISTHMUS.

A company of marines from the United States auxiliary cruiser Dixie, under command of Capt. Wrt McCreary, was landed at Colon yesterday morning and took a train for Panama, where a camp was established in the canal company's buildings. Another company of marines, to the number of 50, from the Dixie, left on the afternoon train for Panama.

The actual purpose of the United States government in landing the marines is believed to be connected with the precautionary measures now being carried out on both sides of the isthmus, and, perhaps, also for the moral effect which the landing of the marines may have on the native garrison at Panama, the loyalty of which, though hitherto absolutely unswerving, has been questioned in some quarters, especially since the discovery of the plot against the life of General Huertas, commander-in-chief of the force of the Republic of Panama, and the alleged effort on the part of a few army officers to persuade the garrison to revolt.

It is considered significant that the point selected for the encampment of the Dixie's marines, while it is highest and best so far as sanitary conditions are concerned on the line of the Panama Railroad, it is also on the trail most frequently used in the past for the movement of troops overland from the Cauca district into the Chiriqui district. If a body of Colombian troops should succeed in obtaining a foothold in the rich Chiriqui district it is generally conceded that after predatory raids on the country side they could retreat to the mountain fastnesses, from which it would be difficult to dislodge them.

There is no doubt that the naval authorities took into consideration the moral effect on the Colombian government of the establishment of a marine camp at Panama.

General Huertas is about to establish a small garrison of the troops of the new republic at Yaviza, a town at the head of San Miguel bay, on the Pacific side of the isthmus.

### OPERATOR'S BATTLE WITH NEGROES.

Single-handed, and with no chance to summon aid, Operator J. R. Largonot, stationed in the Pittsburg and Lake Erie Railroad telegraph tower at Alliquippa Park, near Pittsburg, Pa., a mile distant from any habitation, battled with three negroes at an early hour yesterday morning until he was overcome. He was beaten into insensibility and robbed of about \$50. His assailants left him bound in a chair. Operator Largonot had just received orders for the Cleveland express and was awaiting its arrival. A knock was heard at the door, and when he opened it three negroes forced their way into the little office. Largonot drove his assailants back several times with a heavy club, but eventually he was knocked down and beaten until he became unconscious. When he revived the negroes had gone, but the office had been thoroughly ransacked and \$50 of Largonot's money stolen. The negroes are supposed to have gone into the direction of Youngstown.
