CHURCH AND STATE.

"The New World was discovered by Catholics, and the cross was planted in the name of the church. We cannot get it out of our heads that Catholics will yet claim the New World again." This hope was expressed by Archbishop James E. Quigley in an address before the Roman Catholic Woman's League in Chicago yesterday.

The archbishop declared that the security of the national constitution increases proportionately with the increase in the number of Roman Catholics. He urged the establishment of a subsidiary system of the public schools for the benefit of the Roman Catholics. "This system for the benefit of the minority," said the speaker, "should be paid for by the State, but controlled by the church." Finally he characterized the rule requiring the candidates for public school teachers to have normal school training to be nothing more nor less than "tyranny" and "oppression."

The supreme and fundamental error of the age is liberalism, urged the archbishop. "Liberalism delegates to the state all rights, and this is when the state and the church conflict." The education of the child, he added, should rest with the church and not with the state. He declared that the United States constitution stood for individualism. He asserted that today the state is encroaching on the rights of the church, and that God is not recognized in any of the modern constitutions. "Protestants and non-Catholics," the archbishop continued, "are undertaking through the present public school system to prevent the Catholic children from becoming firmly cemented to their church and to keep the Catholic Church from getting a stronger foothold. The purpose of the non-Catholics is to prevent the growth of the church. They will scruple at no violation of justice to gain their ends. 'The state,' he urged, "must provide schools for the minority as well as for the majority. The State should divide the public school system and maintain a separate system for the minority—separate in the sense of religious teaching. The two systems could be under one control, but in the Catholic division Catholic principles should be taught. This would give the minority an equal chance with the majority. This would be just and equitable, but not satisfactory to the Protestants. The cry all over is for non-sectarian education. The Catholic schools are recognized by the State, but they are not supported by the State because non-Catholics believe that it would be dangerous for the State to support them."

SITUATION IN THE EAST.
Considerable anxiety it is said exists in the best informed circles of London regarding the possible outcome of the situation in the Far East. Fears, it is said, are expressed that the Russian government may have overstepped the bounds which would make a continuation of peaceful negotiations with Japan possible. It may be regarded as quite certain, it is asserted, that Japan will not accept the principles of the last Russian note, which are altogether at variance with Japan's contentions and that Japan's reply must necessarily be cast in this sense. Apart from the delicate state of the negotiations between the two nations, it is also known that Russia is assuming a more defiant attitude, and the outlook may be regarded as more gloomy than it hitherto has been although it cannot be said that the resources of diplomacy have been completely exhausted.

While no news has been received at the Japanese legation at Peking that Japan has sent an ultimatum to Russia, it is recognized at the legation that a grave crisis is approaching. While the knowledge of the legation on the situation leads to the belief that the sending of an ultimatum is impossible, the prospects of war are evidently increasing. The British legation some days ago received a telegram indicating that war was possible, and the Japanese legation is officially informed that Russia's recent reply to the Japanese proposal was unsatisfactory. The native press recently reiterated a circumstantial story to the effect that in the event of Manchuria being retained by Russia, it was the intention of Great Britain to establish a protectorate over the Yangtze valley as compensation, and to appoint a "viceroi" therein, so that her prestige in the Far East would be equal to Russia's.

ASSAULTED AND ROBBED.
Miss Sophia Magee, residing at Norwood Pa., while returning from Holmes with a friend yesterday was waylaid by a negro. The man beat and assaulted the young woman, then stole her money and jewelry and ran away. Miss Magee's companion was more fortunate. As soon as she discerned the negro she turned and ran back toward her home and made good her escape. Miss Magee had been visiting a friend at Holmes, and was on her way Norwood. The negro approached them from a clump of trees, and, rushing at them, knocked his victim down. Miss Magee's companion screamed and ran down the pike toward Norwood. Miss Magee was assaulted and left lying on the frozen road. The negro threatened to kill her if she raised an alarm and then robbed her of her jewelry and \$9 in money. More dead than alive, bleeding from wounds about the head and face, the negro's victim dragged herself to her feet a few moments after her assailant had run away. She staggered a few yards and then fell to the ground unconscious. There she was found by a party of men who had run all the way from Norwood and who had been told of what

had occurred by Miss Magee's companion. She was carried to Holmes station where she was placed in the care of physicians. A posse was formed and the locality is being scoured. If the fiend is captured he may be lynched.
