THE DOMINICAN SITUATION.

The gunboat Independencia arrived at San Domingo Saturday night with two captured Dominican schooners in tow.

The schooner carried arms and ammunition of war intended for coast defense.

The Independencia bombarded the suburbs of the city on Sunday with the object of driving the revolutionists out.

It is officially reported that Rani and San Cristobal have been retaken by the government troops.

There was a severe encounter between the government troops and the revolutionists at Haina, with a result favorable to the government.

The tug Ana, the property of an estate at San Isidro, was prevented by the revolutionists from reaching the estate, and the owners applied for protection to United States Minister Powell.

The latter informed the government that if they could not protect the Ana he would.

Commander Mertz, of the United States gunboat Newport, furnished an armed convoy for the Ana, equipped with a field gun.

The two boats were ready to leave when the government endeavored to prevent their departure.

Minister Powell promptly directed that the boats should proceed, and said that he and Commander Mertz would accept all responsibility for their action.

Later Minister Powell and Commander Mertz waited upon the President and told him that if his government could not protect American property the Newport could and would.

The Ana carried, which the revolutionists hoped to capture.

The government has issued a decree closing the ports of Azua de Compost, Ila, San Pedro de Macoris, Samana, Sanchez, Porto Plata and Monte Cristi, to take effect within 20 days.

There was a severe attack on the city Saturday evening, but the troops managed to repulse the revolutionists.

Commerce is completely at a standstill. News from the interior cannot be obtained.

With a firm hand the Washington government from now on will protect America life and property in the island of San Domingo.

The following dispatch received at the Navy Department yesterday from Commander Dillingham, commanding the Detroit, dated at Puerto Plata, January 6, was made public by order of the Secretary:

"In this vicinity anarchy prevails, business at a standstill. Puerto Plata quiet at present. Jimenez authorities collecting duties and dues. Jimenez at Santiago. Revolution not one of principle, but between factions. Will not allow interruption of commerce. Went to Sosua morning of January 3; returned to Puerto Plata yesterday afternoon to see Cherokee out of port. Will coal here today and return to Sosua. Fighting at Sosua December 26 between Morales and Jimenez troops took place on United Fruit Company's property. Without notice houses were looted; lives of United States citizens absolutely disregarded; women and children had to flee for safety; property destroyed. Have forbidden any fighting of any armed force of any party within certain limits necessary to protect lives of United States citizens at Sosua. Commanding officers in the field near Sosua have been so instructed. Left one officer, 16 marines, Colt automatic gun and steam launch at Sosua to see my instructions carried out until my return. Am in signal communication with this force; can control situation. Consults here want guard. Do not think it necessary at present. Am all ready when necessary. British steamer Pallas here. Have joined British captain in note to military commander here, holding him responsible for any disorder and telling him that we would take such prompt action as we see fit in case of disorder."

DIED AFTER LIFE OF SUFFERING.—After being separated from his mother for thirty years, Charles T. Spaulding came from San Francisco to Boston, saw his mother and died there while she was sitting at his bedside.

It was an eighty-day race across the country against death, and Spaulding won. Spaulding, at the age of 15, sailed from New Bedford on the whaling bark Josephine, which was lost in the Arctic Ocean.

He travelled hundreds of miles over ice packs and suffered tortures from cold and hunger. Spaulding finally landed in San Francisco, where he married and had since lived. The ill effects of his awful experiences in the Arctic regions manifested themselves long ago, blood poisoning set in and his sufferings were terrible. He submitted to 27 surgical operations, one arm and one leg being amputated, and at last four weeks ago realizing that he was dying, he expressed the desire to see his dear old mother once more before he passed away.

He bade his wife and son farewell, and started across the country. He arrived in Boston Saturday last, and died on Monday. His heart-broken mother was by his bedside and holding his hand.
