



Colored Bishop Tired of Country.

Bishop Wm. Benjamin Derrick, for four years presiding Bishop of the New York Diocese of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, is tired of America and yearns for the land of his forefathers in Africa.

The lynchings and burnings of the American negroes and the alarming prevalence of the mob spirit are too much for him, he told the members of the New York Conference Monday at a meeting held in the Bridge Street African Methodist Church, when he delivered his farewell address.

"I believe that across the seas there is a wider and better field for me. Every manly negro must feel the weight that he has to bear and grieve over the conditions that confront the race here," said the Bishop. "Two hundred thousand negroes stood up against the enemies of this country who had taken the nation by the throat and tried to crush it to death. It was the negroes that tore the bonds of secession and the shackles of treason from the nation. Forty-two years ago I stood ankle-deep in blood in the fight between the Merimac and Monitor and the blood of my comrades flew upon me as they were slaughtered in the defense of this nation, and yet the nation, although we fought to save the American flag, declares that we are not citizens and affords us no protection. We cannot but help feeling badly over the situation. This is no country for us. I do not advocate retaliation but we should stand up manfully and protest, and appeal to the few friends that we have left to see to it that we get justice, since we are here. I will not say retaliation, for that will be telling you to be brutal, and I would be promoting the brutality of white men. But we cannot win by preaching to much peace and brotherly love for as soon as the negro shows too much of this spirit the white man says he is a coward. The manly man strikes back. We demand manhood rights, not black manhood rights nor white manhood rights. I do not ask for social equality or amalgamation, but for our own choice of selection as to taste and fitness. I want everything that any other man may have. But the white man cannot be just to us because he has in him none of the spirit of Christ."

Fire Insurance Combine.

All fire insurance companies in this country and all foreign companies represented in Philadelphia have to a certain extent entered into a gigantic combination. Uniform rates are to be fixed for the same classes of risks in all cities, uniform legislation in all States and cities is to be advocated, and all technical work of all the companies is hereafter to be done by a central board, instead of by local State or city boards, as has been the custom.

The fright brought to insurance men by the succession of the Baltimore and Rochester fires has wiped out old disagreements and yesterday the National Board of Underwriters and the committee of twenty came to an agreement for a union of all interests.

A special committee of seven was appointed to carry out the plans and an assessment made upon each company doing business in the country to make up a fund of \$100,000 annually to carry on the work.

Hereafter the tremendous influence of the combined capital of all companies will set as a unit in endeavoring to secure uniform building laws, uniform fire regulations, uniform protective measures in all big buildings and uniform rates. Up to this time each local board has been obliged to think out its own plans and struggle as best it could to carry them out.

C. A. Hexamer, chairman of the local board of underwriters, of Philadelphia, says: "The combination of all companies for united action is in no sense a trust. It might be likened to a combination of all railroads to have the civil engineering throughout the country planned by a central body and all improvements upon a uniform plan. The committee of seven appointed will now plan and aid in carrying out a similar series of regulations affecting the safety of buildings in all cities. Similar districts in all cities will be all rated the same. There is nothing in the combination to be feared by business men. It will be a help to all."

To Be Hanged Tomorrow.

Henry Williams, the negro convicted of assault and attempting to murder Mrs. George J. Shields and her infant child in Roanoke, will be hanged in the jail yard Friday. The city sergeant of Roanoke has completed his arrangements for tickets of admission, and it is said he is harassed considerably with applications for tickets of admission by individuals afflicted with morbid curiosity, among whom are a number of women. These have been positively refused tickets, but it is said that some will yet strive to get a glimpse by securing seats at the upper windows of the courthouse, which overlooks the jail yard. The sergeant left Roanoke this afternoon for Lynchburg and will return with the negro Friday morning. On his arrival the negro will be placed in a
