



National Arbitration Tribunal.

Bishop Spalding, of Peoria, a member of the late coal strike commission, in prefacing his remarks before the House committee on labor Tuesday, said that the exclamation of General Sherman, "War is hell," could well be brought up to date, so as to be, "A strike is hell." The bishop was giving his views on the Foss bill to create a national arbitration tribunal to settle differences between labor and capital. "Strikes are a great evil," the bishop said. "The men are out for six months or so, and when they go back to work they are different men. Their children have been taught to taunt human beings and the moral life of their family is ruined. 'Our government,'" he declared, "should aim first at the good of human beings, before the good of wealth or classes." He sounded a warning to the laboring masses that unless the "warfare" of labor should lessen, public opinion would turn away from organized labor. He quoted John Mitchell as saying that without the aid of public opinion, organized labor would disintegrate. He said that the right of labor to organize or to strike should not be denied, but that continued strikes were demoralizing and fail to attain the desired ends. Some of the large unions, Bishop Spalding charged, forced strikes in order to maintain their prestige. The tribunal authorized by the bill, in his opinion, would loom up before the whole nation, and would little by little win the way to public favor. It would be "a school in public opinion," he said, and would educate capital and labor to agree among themselves and "settle their differences as wise men and not as fools."

Charged With Heresy.

The fifty-sixth annual session of the New York East Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, which began in New York city yesterday, will be a notable one because of a heresy trial that will engage the attention of the ministers, charges having been brought against Prof. Borden P. Bowne, of Boston University. He is charged with teaching doctrines contrary to those of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The charges against Professor Bowne submitted to Presiding Elder Charles S. Wing are:

1. He denies the Trinitarian conception of the Deity, and also the moral attributes of the Deity as set forth in the First and Fourth Articles of Religion of the Methodist Episcopal Church.
2. His teaching on miracles is such as to weaken, if not destroy, faith in large portions of the Old and New Testaments.
3. He denies the doctrine of the Atonement.
4. He teaches such views of the divine government and of the future of souls as destroy the future punishment of the wicked and the future reward of the righteous.
5. He teaches views on the subject of sin and salvation, on repentance, justification, regeneration and assurance of salvation through the witness of the Spirit that do not represent the views of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

She Slew Savage Beasts.

Wounded almost unto death by two ferocious mountain lions, which attacked her on a road near Clay Run, 12 miles east of Connellsville, Pa., Miss Mary Doherty, a society young woman, of Pittsburg, was found shortly after dark Sunday evening. By her side lay the carcasses of the two animals which she had riddled with bullets before losing consciousness. Miss Doherty had left Clay Run Sunday morning to spend the day at the home of a former schoolmate. While returning, and but a half-mile from the village, she was startled by the wild beasts, which sprang from behind a rock on the hillside. Before she could recover from her fright the lions were upon her. Drawing a small revolver from her bosom, Miss Doherty opened fire on the enraged animals, killing one and wounding the other. Overcome by nervous strain, the young woman then fell to the ground, bleeding from numerous cuts about the neck, face and body. At the sight of its almost senseless victim, the wounded lion renewed its attack. Seizing her weapon the second time Miss Doherty fired. Her aim was true, and the wounded lion fell dead by her side. While returning from a drive to his home in Mill Run, Philip Cox, a young farmer, almost drove over the prostrate form of the young woman, which was lying in the centre of the roadside.

Killed by Falling Wall.

The worst fire in recent years in York, Pa., occurred yesterday, wiping out the big-six story brick factory of the York Carriage Company, damaging the big implement warehouse of Earnest & the foundry of the Variety Iron, nine dwellings and other property, causing a loss of \$200,000. By lapse of a wall of the plant of the Carriage Company three firemen killed and three injured. The fire

originated in a storeroom on the first floor of the factory, where a carload of excelsior became ignited, and in less than 10 minutes the fire was raging fiercely throughout the building. The structure being well equipped with fire-escapes, the men and women in it got out without accident. One man leaped from a third-story window and another down an elevator shaft, and both were but slightly injured. For a time the flames threatened the entire northern business section of the city, and it was only by the heroic work of the firemen that the blaze was gotten under control. Four hundred and fifty employes are rendered idle by the fire.
