THE NEGRO IN THE NORTH.

The House on Friday took up the bill to provide for a delegate in Congress from Alaska, but in the debate which followed Mr. Granger (R. I.) briefly discussed the business feature of the social system of the United States, and Mr. Bowers (Miss.) answered some statements recently made by Mr. Gillett (Mass.) regarding alleged violations of the Constitution of some of the Southern States with respect to negro suffrage.

He read from various decisions of Mississippi courts holding that the State did not discriminate against the negro and that it had been fair and impartial in the enforcement of the suffrage clause of the constitution. He declared that the negro was as safe in the hands of the Governor of Mississippi as in those of the Governor of Massachusetts and said that in Mississippi the negroes' rights to life, liberty, property and the pursuit of happiness were as carefully guarded as by any other State.

The only State in which lynching had been prevented by the swift and timely interposition of the law was in Mississippi and this, he said, was due to the personal action of the Governor.

Mr. Bowers made a comparison of the criminal statistics of Massachusetts and Mississippi and said these showed that the negroes in the latter State are six times better than those of Massachusetts. In Mississippi, he said, every avenue of labor was opened to the negro and every opportunity given to improve his condition by industry and toil. He pointed with pride, he said, to the fact that in this State the ratio of mulattoes to the colored population was less today than at any time since the war. He declared that there was less intermingling with negroes than ever before and that the mulatto steadily has become with the people of Mississippi "an incident and recollection of the past."

Mr. Bowers asserted that the negroes' entry into politics simply was to serve a party expedient and that his political baptism was in aid of republican ascendancy. He believed, he said, that race purity could be preserved absolutely by the utter segregation of the races in every scholastic relation. The slightest intermingling of the races, he declared, was fraught with peril. He said that the negro was not fit for self-government, and he was greeted with democratic applause when he said the negro, within constitutional limits, should be eliminated as a political factor.

"I thank God," he added, "the Constitution of Mississippi swept the circle of expedient to accomplish that end."
