Port Arthur and Vladivostok Menaced.

Viceroy Alexieff telegraphs under yesterday's date that Japanese ships were sighted six miles off Port Arthur Thursday night, and that yesterday morning 10 Japanese cruisers and six torpedo boats were seen in Ussuri bay, adjacent to Vladivostok. The Viceroy's report that a Japanese squadron was seen off Port Arthur, followed by another announcing that a squadron of Japanese ships was in sight off Vladivostok causes anxiety in St. Petersburg. Naval circles are speculating whether the enemy will venture to approach Vladivostok at closer range than last time.

There are persistent rumors of fighting on the Yalu river, but the Associated Press correspondent is informed that no serious engagements have taken place, and that the fighting has been limited to affairs of outpost, the Russians contesting and harassing the Japanese advance.

Seventy-three Japanese were killed or drowned as a result of the sinking of the Japanese transport Kinshiu-Maru, which was torpedoed by the Russian armored cruiser Rossia at midnight Monday last. The determination of the Japanese on board and their defiance of the Russians to the last was remarkable. The Kinshiu-Maru parted from the convoy of torpedo boats in a fog on Monday at 11:30 p. m. with the Russian fleet. She was ordered to stop and the Rossia steamed alongside, summoned her navigating officers on board the Rossia and sent a searching party on board the transport. This party discovered two companies of soldiers concealed below and reported the fact to the Rossia. The latter discharged a torpedo, which struck the Kinshiu-Maru amidships and broke her in two. While the transport was sinking the soldiers on board of her rushed on deck and fired volleys from their rifles into the Rossia, and as the Kinshiu-Maru sank several of the soldiers committed suicide. Three boats which floated free from the wreckage were the means of saving 45 soldiers and 9 of the Kinshiu-Maru's passengers and crew. Two captains and three lieutenants were among the soldiers drowned. The survivors succeeded in getting ashore, and were conveyed to Gensan. Later advices from Gensan confirm the reports that the Japanese soldiers killed or drowned at the time of the sinking of the Kinshiu-Maru refused to surrender to the Russians, preferring death. One non-commissioned officer committed barakiri (suicide), according to an ancient custom, and the others used rifles to kill themselves. The official reports agree in placing the number of men lost at 75. It is not known here many Japanese the Russians took from the ship or rescued a torpedo before sinking. It is possible that more survivors will be found, as one of the Kinshiu-Maru's boats is still missing.

The Social Evil.

The closing conference of the National Florence Crittenton Mission was held in Washington last night. Its chief feature was a discussion by Mrs. Kate W. Barrett of what can be done to lessen the social evil. Mrs. Barrett has had many years of work in the field covered by the mission. Briefly her suggestions were:

1. Stop the sale of liquor in disorderly houses.
2. Establish close police supervision and authority over such places.
3. Enforce a record to be kept of every inmate of a disorderly house, giving her age, history so far as obtainable, condition, etc.
4. Require that all recruits before being permitted to enter a disorderly house shall report to the chief of police.
5. Make it possible for a girl to earn an honest living.

While not advocating that police supervision and authority should be carried to the extent it is in some foreign cities, where the social evil is a legally recognized institution, Mrs. Barrett held that a certain degree of this supervision and authority with its necessary accompaniment of segregation, must be provided. In no other way, she said, can the problem be dealt with successfully.

At the St. Louis Exposition Mr. Crittenton will hold a series of evangelistic meetings and Mrs. Barrett will be present with a corps of active workers to aid unfortunate women.

At yesterday's session Dr. Tabor Johnson and Dr. A. Adams Thomas discussed the opportunity of the Christian physician to aid unfortunate girls.

The delegates visited Mount Vernon and Arlington in the afternoon and also attended a reception given to them by Mr. Crittenton in his Alexandria home. Here the visitors were met by a large number of Alexandrians. During the evening refreshments were served.
