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### Celebrates Victory.

The reports which have been received in Tokio of the successive blocking of the entrance of Port Arthur harbor by the Japanese, coming on the heels of the news of the victory on the Yalu, stirred Tokio to another popular demonstration, and last night thousands of men carrying lanterns, paraded through the city. Half a dozen bands of music led the various processions. The offices of the war and navy departments and of the general staff were the scenes of the greatest enthusiasm. Two of the imperial princes visited the Navy Department and the assembled crowd welcomed them with cheers. Then the throng demanded Admiral Ito, chief of the general staff and the hero of the fight on the Yalu during the Sino-Japanese war. He appeared in response to the calls of the people and saluted the crowd.

The report which has reached Tokio from Europe that General Kuropatkin, the commander in chief of the Russian troops in the Far East, is personally leading 20,000 men from Liao Yang to Fong Wang Cheng, is welcomed as good news on the theory that the more aggressive the Russian campaign becomes the more speedy will be Japan's final victory.

The Tokio correspondents of both the London Daily Telegraph and the Daily Chronicle assert that Port Arthur is effectually "cooked."

Richard Chester, of Tanegashima Island, Japan, a contractor to the Japanese government in Victoria, B. C., en route to the Orient. He states that at least 10 per cent. of the Japanese soldiers in the field are women disguised as men. He says that the average Japanese woman of the coolie class is as strong, if not stronger, than the man.

### Mr. Bryan and the National Convention.

Members of the Democratic Success League recently organized in Omaha, Neb., say they are convinced it is Mr. Bryan's purpose to leave the national convention if he cannot have what he wants. "Within a month," said one of the members of the league yesterday, "J. F. Harley, of Lincoln, told Mr. Bryan he would like to be a candidate to the St. Louis convention. He explained his position on public questions and promised Mr. Bryan he would back him in everything he wanted. 'Will you stay with me in a bolt if it should come to that?' asked Mr. Bryan, and Harley replied that he would not. A few days later, Tom Worrell, Mr. Bryan's right hand man at Lincoln, called on Harley, and told him that he could not possibly be a delegate to St. Louis, giving as his reason Mr. Harley's refusal to bolt if necessary."

Members of the Success League assert that they are not fighting Bryan. Their chief concern is to see that a delegation represents Nebraska in the national convention that will not bolt under any conditions. They expect to see Mr. Bryan lead a movement out of the hall if they do not get his way.

Mr. Bryan controlled the democratic convention in his home county yesterday, and a platform reaffirming the Kansas City platform was adopted. No names for the presidential nomination were mentioned, the convention voting to adopt the unit rule, and practically agreeing to act as Mr. Bryan thinks best in the national convention.

### Farming Not Declining.

We often hear the somewhat dogmatic statement made that the agriculture of the United States is on a decline. So much is written and printed concerning the growth of the towns and cities of the country that it is little marvel that the idea is becoming fixed that the people are all deserting the farms. Otherwise it is difficult to perceive where all the people come from. But this is not to take into account the opposite movement which in some measure offsets the movement to the cities, nor the fact that a vast majority of the emigrants who pour into the north and west settle in towns.

As a matter of fact farming has kept up with the other industries of the nation. There has been no real decline, although in the early days of the republic a much greater per cent. of the population depended upon agricultural pursuits for a living. When the war broke out in 1860 there were 2,000,000 farms in America. In 1900 there were 5,730,000 farms in America. In 1870 the value of farm products was a little less than 2,000 millions of dollars. In 1900 it was 3,764 millions of dollars. In 1870 there were little short of 6,000,000 persons engaged in agriculture. In 1900 there were 10,438,000 persons engaged in agriculture.
