FOREIGN NEWS.

The Berlin Die Post reports that three prominent members of the Russian Red Cross executive force, a prince, a count, and a general, have been detected misappropriating funds. The general secured \$1,000,000 to cover his losses on the bourse, while the prince and count took lesser amounts. The Czarina, says the paper, paid the amount stolen to prevent a scandal.

C. M. Howe arrested for check swindling in connection with certain real estate deals and who is said to be wanted in several cities for swindling in amounts aggregating thousands of dollars, was held under \$1,000 bonds on the local charges in New Haven, Conn., today.
