



### Female Forger.

A gorgeously gowned, handsome and aristocratic-looking woman was arraigned in Jefferson Market Court, New York, yesterday, charged with forgery. She was arrested Thursday night in the Fifth Avenue Hotel, where she had registered earlier in the day as Mrs. E. D. Rollins, of Philadelphia. Soon after the arrival at the hotel she went into Knox's hat store, in the hotel building, and bought a hat for \$6. In payment she tendered a check on the Second National Bank, which is also in the hotel building. The check was signed "Mrs. Marshall Rawlins." The cashier of Knox's store stepped into the bank to inquire about the check. Something about the woman had made him suspicious. As soon as the cashier of the bank saw it he became excited. "That woman," he said, "has been forging checks on this bank for three years. She has no account here and we have never been able to reach her." The bank cashier and Knox's man went into the hotel and found that Mrs. Rollins was in her room. The hotel detective was notified, while a hurried trip was made to Jefferson Market Court for a warrant. Mrs. Rollins remained in her room until about 6 o'clock, when she walked up to the desk and called for her bill. It was \$12. She wrote out a check on the Second National Bank, signing it "Mrs. Marshall Rawlins," and tendered it. Then the hotel detective arrested her. In the last two years this woman, it is alleged, has made two complete tours of the United States, moving leisurely from city to city and leaving a trail of bogus checks behind. She has sent more than 200 checks to the Second National alone, the largest being for \$200. Richmond, Va., was recently visited by a woman answering the description of the prisoner and \$1,000 in bad checks passed. Complaints of her operations in Baltimore, Chicago, San Francisco, New Orleans and other cities have been received by the police. See was held in \$500 bail.

### Young Woman Thrown from Horse.

Miss Caroline James, the young daughter of Mrs. C. E. James, of Ardsley-on-the-Hudson, lies dying at the residence of W. S. Forbes, in Richmond, as the result of being thrown from a runaway horse yesterday afternoon. Her spinal column was fractured and she sustained other injuries of a serious nature. Miss James went to Richmond three weeks ago to be the guest of Mrs. Forbes. Her beauty and vivacity made her a general favorite, and she was the object of numerous social attentions. It was her intention to have returned home several days ago, but she was persuaded to remain to attend the annual race meet of the Deep Run Hunt Club yesterday. Yesterday afternoon, mounted on a spirited horse and attended by Blanchard Forbes, the son of her hostess, she started for the grounds of the Deep Run Hunt Club. A short distance from Richmond her horse became frightened and suddenly bolted. He took the bit in his teeth and Miss James was unable to check him. Mr. Forbes gave chase but was unable to gain on the flying steed. At a turn in the road the horse gave a plunge which hurled Miss James head first against a telegraph pole, inflicting grave injuries. The stricken girl was brought in an ambulance to the home of Mrs. Forbes, where she now hovers between life and death. Miss James is a daughter of C. E. James, who died three years ago. Her father was prominently connected with the American Wall Paper Company, of which her uncle is president. Her mother now resides in a handsome home at Ardsley.

### Mayor Moss in a Fight.

Mayor Allan A. Moss, William T. Moss, a prominent lawyer, and Robert W. Perkins, an anti-administration politician, were arrested in Newport News yesterday afternoon by Chief of Police Thomas M. Johnson for fighting in the street. Immediately after lodging his prisoners at the police station Chief Johnson arrested himself on the charge of cursing and abusing the three combatants in the public street. All were admitted to bail to appear in the Police Court this morning. The fight is one of several exciting climaxes marking the bitter campaign for the mayoralty now in progress. Perkins, who is one of the campaign managers for Samuel R. Buxton, Mayor Moss's opponent in the race, is alleged to have circulated false reports reflecting upon the integrity of the administration. The Mayor met Perkins in front of the City Hall yesterday afternoon and accused him of malicious lying. Both men were accompanied by friends, who became involved in the ensuing exchange of hot words. Perkins struck at Mayor Moss, the Mayor's brother, whereupon the Mayor smashed Perkins in the face. Chief Johnson and Sergeant of Police O'Hara threw themselves upon the combatants, all of whom were taken to the station. After being bailed Mayor Moss offered to drive outside the city limits with Perkins and fight to a finish with bare knuckles.
