Old Dominion Boat Club.

With the return of spring, interest is again awakened in one of Alexandria's foremost institutions—the Old Dominion Boat Club. This club was founded in 1881 by a body of our public spirited citizens, who, desirous of promoting the city's pleasures, and contributing to the improvement of its young men created the nucleus of its present organization.

And to these founders alone is due much of the club's prosperity and success; for, having formulated a constitution based on conservatism, they have ever maintained these principles with unwavering zeal, and never in periods of gloom or disaster, when dissolution seemed to threaten, have they abated one iota their fidelity and support.

The club has now a membership of upwards of 80, the majority of whom are active and enthusiastic lovers of aquatic sport; its house is equipped with boats of various types, including the single and four-oared racing shells of modern design, single and double outriggers and a full complement of pleasure canoes.

Its management purposes holding a regatta on the afternoon of the 30th instant, which the public is cordially invited to witness, and for which the following programme has been arranged:

Depredations of Thieves.

During the past few nights thieves have broken the glass in the windows of Mr. W. P. Graves's store, northwest corner of Franklin and Fairfax streets, and stole various articles. Officer Young has been investigating the case, and he has reasons for believing that the offenses are committed by youngsters living in the neighborhood. Cars on Union street, south of Gibbon, have recently been broken open and robbed.

Church Claims.

A bill referring the claims of Virginia churches to the Court of Claims for adjudication was passed just before the adjournment of Congress. They are 58 in number and aggregate \$140,048.65. The claims grew out of the occupancy of churches by federal troops during the civil war. The trustees of St. Paul's Church in this city have a claim for \$5,000; M. E. Church South \$5,000, and the Baptist Church \$6,500. Testimony in connection with the claim of the M. E. Church South was taken yesterday, and that of the Baptist Church today. W. W. Scott, assistant attorney in the Department of Justice, appeared in behalf of the government, and Mayor G. W. Z. Black for the churches. Testimony in connection with the claim of St. Paul's Church will be taken later.

Baseball.

Alexandria lovers of baseball will be glad to know that the Alexandria baseball team has re-organized for the season of 1904. They have added several out of town players which will strengthen the team materially. They have a large schedule to offer the patrons and hope there will be no trouble in raising the necessary funds to properly equip and maintain a creditable team for the city. Tomorrow afternoon at 4:00 o'clock they will cross bats on the Fair Grounds with a team organized among the clerks in the general offices of the Southern Railway at Washington. These people have a good strong team and all who come out may expect to see a fast snappy game. Monday afternoon, May 30th, they play the Riverides, considered to be one of the best amateur teams of Washington and a very close game is expected.

The Retail Trade.

Many of the retail merchants of Alexandria are allowing their trade to gradually leave the city from sheer lack of enterprise and failure to advertise what they have for sale. Daily people go elsewhere for every description of articles which could be bought at home if it were only known that such articles were for sale here. When Alexandria's retail trade was of great importance her merchants were regular advertisers; but things have changed.

The Postoffice.

The finishing touches to the postoffice building are now being made, and the entire structure having been painted, it makes an imposing appearance. Work on the interior is still in progress, but it is rapidly approaching completion. Part of the enclosure on the west has been arranged for a flower garden, and when all the contemplated changes shall have been made, the Alexandria postoffice both within and without will be attractive.

Runaway Boys.

Elmer Burton and John Hunter, two Fredericksburg boys, animated by a Jack Harlaw spirit, left home a day or two ago and it is supposed proceeded toward this city in search of adventures. The father of Burton came here yesterday and requested Lieutenant Smith to search for the youngsters. The lieutenant obtained a description of the youths and directed the officers to keep a sharp lookout for them.

The Corporation Commission in Richmond yesterday granted a charter to the Whiteley Wool Company (incorporated) with the capital stock of \$400,000. The principal office will be in Alexandria, and Mr. Gardner L. Booth will be the State agent. The officers of the company are: W. I. Hooper, president, and Della Hooper, secretary, both of Poplar Bluff, Missouri.

An accident to a handcar occurred near Fairfax yesterday which resulted in the injury of several section hands, but fortunately none of them was seriously hurt. The car with a number of men on board was running at a high rate of speed when the wheels left the track and all the men were thrown to the ground. All sustained cuts about their heads and hands.
