Weddings.

The church was prettily decorated for the occasion, and the ceremony was performed by Rev. William J. Morton the rector. A large number of the friends and acquaintances of the contracting parties were present. The bride was attired in a gown of panne white crepe over white tulle. Instead of a veil, she wore a wreath of white roses and carried a bouquet of white roses. She was attended by Miss Elizabeth McKnew, of Washington, as maid of honor, attired in white organdie and carrying bride roses. Miss Anna Dawson, of Washington, and Miss Margaret Cockrell, of this city, were bridesmaids. They were also gowned in white organdie and carried bouquets of pink roses. Mr. Leon Pill, brother of the bride, acted as best man. The ushers were Messrs. Frank Beckham and William Wilkins, of this city; William Stone, of Washington, and Claude Coffee, of St. Louis, Mo. Habeas Corpus.

In Raleigh, N. C., on Tuesday Joseph Daniels, editor of the Raleigh News and Observer, by reason of some publication he made was adjudged guilty of contempt by Judge Purnell, of the United States Court, and given into the custody of a United States deputy marshal, instead of being committed to jail for refusal to pay the \$2,000 fine assessed against him. Mr. Daniels declared he would spend any amount of time in jail before he will pay any part of the fine. R. T. Gray, of counsel for Daniels, left at once for Washington to apply to Chief Justice Fuller for a writ of habeas corpus. The answer submitted by counsel for Mr. Daniels sets out that the publication is not libelous, and did not tend to impair the respect due to the authority of the court. The writ was granted today, the parties concerned coming from Washington to this city, where in the office of Mr. R. P. W. Garnett, clerk of the U. S. District and Circuit Courts, Judge Pritchard, at the suggestion of Justice Fuller, signed the writ. Judge Pritchard directed that Daniels be brought before him at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon at Raleigh. Beside Judge Pritchard, ex-Gov. Jarvis and Messrs. Pugh and Gray, of North Carolina, were in the clerk's office. This is the first time Judge Pritchard, who had only qualified in Richmond yesterday, had signed an order and, at his request, Clerk Garnett presented him with the pen with which the order was signed.

Championship Games.

The Retail Clerks' Union of this city, which will give its first annual excursion on Monday, June 6, has succeeded in bringing about a championship game of baseball between the heavy-hitting Norris Peters team, of Washington, and a crack team picked out of six companies of artillerymen stationed at Fort Washington. The soldiers have secured the services of a pitcher from Fort McHenry. He will do the twirling on that day and they claim the game is as good as won. The game will be called at 3:30 p. m. There will be a good game the morning of the same day between two of the church league teams of this city—the Southern Methodist and Episcopalians. This game will be called at 11:30 a. m.

City Democratic Committee.

A meeting of the city democratic committee was held at the Hotel Fleischmann last night when it was decided to hold ward meetings on Tuesday, June 7, between 7 and 8 p. m., to select delegates to the Richmond convention, which will meet on the 9th instant. Each of the four wards of this city is entitled to five delegates. The meetings will be held at places to be announced by the committee hereafter, and will be called to order by members of the city democratic committee, or in their absence by any qualified democratic voter present. The presiding officer in each ward is charged with the duty of seeing that the meeting in that particular ward is properly conducted, and that only qualified voters participate. A resolution adopted by the committee provides that the names of all candidates for delegates shall be filed with the secretary of the committee, Mr. R. T. Cook, by noon on Monday next and pay their proportion of the expense for hall rent. Only persons qualified under the constitution, and who are known democrats, shall be allowed to vote. It was decided to allow the delegates elected who may be unable to attend the convention the privilege of appointing alternates. The committee adjourned until Monday, June 6, at 8 p. m., at the Hotel Fleischmann.

Railroad Notes.

The officials of the Baltimore and Ohio have announced the promotion of Jesse T. Carr from the office of stationmaster in Washington to that of assistant trainmaster of the terminals in that city and the Alexandria division. George W. Propps, who has been assistant stationmaster for several years, has been promoted to the stationmaster at Alexandria.

Mr. C. P. Adams has been appointed Superintendent of Telegraph of the Southern Railway, with headquarters at Washington, vice Mr. C. A. Darlton, resigned.

Failure to Recover Body.

All the efforts so far to recover the body of Frank McComesky, the soldier who was drowned from a sailboat off the shipyard Tuesday night, have proven futile. It is supposed that the body has been carried by the tide some distance from the locality of the drowning.

The Weather.

The cloudy and rainy weather of yesterday continued last night, and this morning broke under the same threatening and uncertain conditions. The wind was from the northeast and the air charged with mist. The temperature had fallen and to some persons it was uncomfortably cool. The tides in the river have been high during the past two days and the water muddy. This morning the Maryland hills and shores were enveloped in mist, and the easterly wind caused the waves to lash the docks on this side of the river.
