Local Matters.

School Board.

The monthly meeting of the City School Board was held last night, Capt. Herbert Bryant presiding.

On the suggestion of the Superintendent the time for the closing of the schools was fixed, the exercises beginning on June 27 and continuing the three following days, and the clerk was directed to have prepared the usual medals and certificates of distinction, for which the necessary appropriation was made.

The resignation of Col. F. L. Smith as a member of the board was read as follows:

To the School Board of the City of Alexandria: Gentlemen—I hand you herewith my resignation as school trustee for the Fourth ward addressed to the City Council, with the request that you transmit it to that body.

The resignation was accepted and the regrets of the members were expressed at the retirement of Col. Smith from the board over which he had so long presided.

Capt. Herbert Bryant was then unanimously elected chairman, and he returned his thanks for the compliment conferred. He promised to perform his duties to the best of his ability, with the support of the members, and expressed his regret that Col. Smith had retired from the board.

The Seminary and High School.

We have received from the committee of arrangements an invitation to attend the joint final celebration of the literary societies of the Episcopal High School, to be held on the 14th inst., at 8:30 o'clock p. m.; also from the principal, Mr. L. M. Blackford, an invitation to attend the commencement exercises of that school which will be held at 3 o'clock on the evening of June 15.

We have also received an invitation from the faculty of the Episcopal Theological Seminary to attend the final exercises of that institution to be held on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, June 15, 16 and 17. On Wednesday evening Bishop Johnson will address the Students' Missionary Society. Thursday will be Graduation and Alumni Day, when the essays will be read by the graduating class; diplomas conferred by Bishop Gibson; an alumni meeting and an address from Rev. W. D. Smith, of Fredericksburg. Friday will be Ordination Day when Bishop Boyd will preach. The graduates this year will be: Alfred Rives Berkeley, A. M.; Churchill Gibson Chamberlayne, B. Body of Drowned Boy.

As was stated in the Gazette, the body of a boy about fourteen years old was found on the southern shore of Hunting creek, near this city, yesterday. No one has, so far, been able to identify the remains. The deceased wore knee trousers, but there was nothing on the body by which its identity could be traced. It was in an advanced stage of decomposition, having been in the water some time. One hand is missing. The remains will be buried by Mr. B. Wheatley today by direction of the Fairfax authorities. Justice Kerby held an inquest this morning, and the verdict was to the effect that the deceased was unknown and that the manner of his death was unknown to the jury.

Virginia Horses.

The fine string of hunters belonging to Mr. Courtland H. Smith, of Hampton Stock Farm, Alexandria county, (and ridden chiefly by their owner), are having a brilliant success at the Philadelphia horse show, in progress this week. Every day records fresh laurels for these fine horses, among the prize winners being Garnet Ripple, Lucy Sutherland, Bo Bar, Up-to-Date, Ogunquit, High Flyer and Hiawatha. In such strong competition these triumphs mean a great deal to Virginia sportsmen.

Removing Embankment.

The Southern Railway Company has a force of workmen engaged in removing the embankment between their tracks in the square bounded by Lee, Union, Wolfe and Wilkes streets. The earth is being used in widening the approach to the B. & O. transfer slip. As has been stated, the company has placed a large sewer alongside the track running east which extends from the tunnel at Lee street to the river.

Board of Aldermen.

A called meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held last night for the purpose of concurring in the action of the Common Council on the appropriation bill and a report of the finance committee on a bill of Dr. E. A. Gorman for professional services in connection with the smallpox cases of last winter. The action of the lower board on both papers was concurred in by unanimous votes.

Ties on the Track.

What is known as the "roustabout" freight train while on its way to this city about half-past ten o'clock last night stopped at St. Asaph Junction. When an attempt was made to start it several ties were discovered on the track. They had been placed under the cars apparently for the purpose of derailing the train.

Jefferson Davis's Birthday.

Today is the anniversary of the birth of Mr. Jefferson Davis, the first and only President of the Southern Confederacy. The schools were given holiday and the mound in Christ Church yard was decorated with flowers, but otherwise the day passed unobserved.

Weddings.

The home of Capt. and Mrs. W. H. Smith was the scene of a pretty wedding Thursday evening when their daughter, Edith, became the bride of Mr. Wilbert C. Baggett. The ceremony was performed by Rev. J. P. Stump, of the M. E. Church South. The bridal party entered the parlor to the strains of the wedding march played by Miss Ruth Murray, of Washington. They were attended by two little girls daintily gowned in white organdie, carrying pink carnations. The bride was handsomely gowned in white silk and lace, and carried bride roses. After receiving congratulations all repaired to the dining room where a bountiful table had been spread. The parlors were decorated in pink and white roses. The presents were numerous and costly. Later Mr. and Mrs. Baggett left for a trip north.

Mr. Benjamin Wheatley and Miss Cora L. Eaton were married last night at Christ Church rectory by Rev. W. J. Morton. Shortly after the ceremony Mr. and Mrs. Wheatley left for a visit to Savannah, Ga., and St. Augustine and Jacksonville, Fla. They will make this city their home.

TO THE OWNERS OF DOGS.

Alexandria, Va., June 1, 1904. All persons owning or intending to keep any animal of the dog or canine species must come forward on or before

JUNE FIFTEENTH, 1904, and take out a license for the same from the auditor. After the 15th of June all persons owning or harboring dogs without the required license shall be fined (as the laws on the subject require) \$5 for every dog so owned or harbored.

Complaint has been frequently made that many persons fail to take out their licenses, and that others pay on one or two dogs when owning and harboring more, or who send such dogs away during the summer months and bring them back in the fall.

Attention has been called to this evasion of the law, and the policemen will report all such cases, and fines will be imposed upon those who fail to take out licenses after trial in the Police Court.
