AMERICAN RABBIS.

The Central Conference of American Rabbis, which has been in session in Louisville, Ky., adjourned yesterday after choosing Cleveland for next year's meeting. The following officers were elected:

Honorary president, Rabbi Kaufman Kohler, Cincinnati; president, Joseph Krauskopf, Philadelphia; first vice president, Joseph S. Tolse, Chicago; second vice president, Jacob Voorsanger, San Francisco; treasurer, Charles S. Levi, Peoria, Ill.; recording secretary, Adolph Guttmacher, Baltimore; corresponding secretary, William Rosenau, Baltimore.

After a strenuous debate on the question of establishing a synod, the conference left the question open, to be taken up at a future conference.

The committee on contemporary history made a voluminous report on events that have transpired since the last conference. The report expressed sorrow over the Slocum steamboat disaster at New York, and ordered that a message expressing sympathy be sent to Dr. Haas, pastor of St. Mark's Church. The Russo-Japanese war was also touched upon in the report, and regret expressed at the loss to the world of "the great and good Pope Leo." The remainder of the report paid tribute to eminent Jews who died during the year.

Concerning the attitude of the American Reformed Jews toward the Russo-Japanese war, the report reads as follows: "Far be it from us to forget the teaching of Scripture, which warns us not to rejoice when our enemies fall. But we shall impress our audience with the greater lesson that tranny is its own destroyer. We shall further not fail to make them understand that through the proposed improvement in the condition of the Russian Jews by allowing unrestricted residence within the border district, the misery of our Russian brethren will not be substantially alleviated. It may be that a sudden transition from the present disabilities into full present freedom while finally the only solution, is for the present fraught with danger. But, on the other hand, full freedom of residence within the whole empire and unrestricted access to the educational institutions are the minimum of what our co-religionists are entitled to demand. Let this message be spoken out clearly, both here and from every congregational pulpit."

Rattlesnakes Loose.

Two Florida diamond-back rattlesnakes, among the largest ever seen caused a small panic among attendants of the snake house at the Zoological Park in New York a day or two ago when they escaped from their crate in the receiving-room and tried to strike at every one in sight. Curator Ditmars was not expecting anything in the snake line this week, and when a large box arrived by express Monday from an agent in Florida it was thought that some of the long-expected river orchids which had been ordered for the alligator tank had at last arrived. Nothing was done with the box until yesterday, when Curator Ditmars and three of his helpers went into the receiving-room and started to unpack it. After the lid had been pried off one end, a man put his hand down among the leaves and moss with which the box was packed and began to feel for the plants. Usually when rattlers arrive at the snake-house their presence is known from their constant rattling, but with these snakes there was not a single rattle until the man's hand came in contact with one of them. The entire contents of the box seemed to come to life suddenly and became one large, hissing, rattling mass of rattlesnakes. In about three seconds two rattlers, each over eight feet in length, slid out of the box and coiled up on the floor. The snakes sprang at the Curator, one of them falling short, but the other managed to fasten his teeth in the cloth of Ditmars's trousers but did not penetrate the flesh. They both coiled again and started a series of springs such as had never before been seen in the snake-house. The room was cleared in about two minutes and the snakes were left masters of the scene. Two long poles with snares of wire at their ends were procured and with great difficulty Curator Ditmars captured the snakes. The snakes are about ten inches in circumference at their thickest part. Curator Ditmars, who has had long experience with all varieties of rattlesnakes, says that they are the largest he has ever seen and that a bite from either of them would probably mean death within twenty minutes.

Murderer Lynched.

Cairo Williams, the negro who killed Thurston O. McGee, white, at Scranton, in Williamsburg county, S. C., last February, was taken from the Atlantic Coast Line train at Scranton yesterday evening and lynched. Williams narrowly escaped lynching immediately after the killing and was spirited off to the penitentiary in Columbia for safe-keeping and the mob was greatly enraged thereat. Last Monday Williams was taken from Columbia to Kingstree, the county seat, for trial. The result was mistrial, and the sheriff thought it safe to send him back to Columbia for safe keeping. As the train approached Scranton, a mob of lynchers, with blackened faces and wearing masks, flagged it down with a red flag and searched the train for the negro, to the great terror of the passengers. Finally they found Williams and ordered the sheriff's deputies to deliver him up. This was refused, and a scuf-
