BISHOP POTTER SCORED.

The Kansas City Branch of the American Young People's Christian Temperance Union strongly disapproves of the ideas of Bishop Potter, of New York, with regard to uplifting the moral tone of the saloon. At a meeting of the union the matter was discussed and a letter addressed to the Bishop. A copy of the letter follows:

"May God have mercy upon your benighted idea of striking 'the keynote of attack upon the liquor situation.' You are, rather, indorsing the key that opens wide the doors to hell for the army of 100,000 souls who annually leave the king's highway and stumble into drunkard's graves. The present situation across the water of 55 bishops in the Church of England as stockholders in breweries and distilleries, with this shameful farce of a bishop in the great Episcopal Church in our own land taking a leading part in the opening exercises of a saloon, closing same by singing the Doxology, should make every professed Christ-follower in the great Episcopal Church hang his head in very shame."

Walter E. Tisne, in the New York Globe, gives his experience in the "Subway Tavern." Among other things he said:

"If one does not believe that the 'Subway Tavern' is a highly moral place (the 'Subway Tavern' as you know, is the saloon, with soda water attachment which Bishop Potter dedicated last Tuesday at Bleeker and Mulberry streets in the shadow of police headquarters) just go there and throw yourself upon the mercy of the bartender. I did this yesterday. That I am still sober I ascribe to the fact that I surreptitiously mixed my whisky with considerable quantities of mineral water and ginger ale. All told, I had eleven drinks of whisky in the saloon dedicated by Bishop Potter, and this within an hour and a half—that is, one drink after another, practically as fast as the bartender could push them over the bar. In theory it sounds rather fine, this saloon, where the dispenser of drinks is supposed to be your guardian angel, but in practice it is the same as in every other saloon either on Broadway or the Bowery."

After telling of taking nine drinks, he says: "On my tenth drink I became unduly profane, and staggered helplessly against the bar. I spilled the contents of my glass on the bar, and it was refilled. I called loudly upon my friends to uphold me, and chided them in Bowery expletives for drinking 'soft stuff.' My eleventh drink was given to me when simulating the last stages of intoxication. I filled my whisky glass to the top, then with a tremulous hand repoured it into the whisky bottle. Never was there a word of admonition spoken to me."

A Perilous Predicament.

After a two-day search for Antonio Boraccio, an Italian quarryman employed with the blasters on the Palisades at Hudson Heights, North Bergen, N. J., he was found wedged in a pocket in the face of the perpendicular rock and nearly 200 feet above the level of the Hudson river.

When his fellow-workers were unable to find Boraccio at quitting hour Tuesday evening they looked around anxiously and even over the edge of the cliff for him. They went away in the belief that he had stolen off unobserved to his home. Inquiry there failed to reveal trace of him, and on Wednesday the section foreman, with a detail of workmen, made a fresh hunt for him. They went into every corner of the quarry, looking behind all the rocks, and even sought traces of his body with the idea that he might have fallen a victim to one of the dynamite blasts. Failure to find him led them to suppose that he had grown tired of his job and had gone away.

A driller on one of the narrow ledges that face the cliff's frontlike steps heard a groan while he was busy with his drill-bar Thursday afternoon and quit his bench to find out whence it came. His efforts were baffled by the noise of the work going on about him, but he gave the alarm, and his fellow-laborers joined in the quest. In the end they traced the moans to a pocket 50 feet down the face of the rock and just below a ledge scarcely wide enough to support a man's body.

There was a deep rift in the rock, and with the aid of lights they saw the form of a man lying face downward. A laborer, lowered with a rope, managed after much effort to get another rope-end around the victim's shoulders. He was so tightly wedged in at the cleft of the pocket that it required the united strength of four men to dislodge him, but he was finally hoisted to the surface.

Without food for two days, he was too weak to stand, and his fears had been destroyed. He was taken to the North Hudson Hospital, where it is believed he will recover his mind.

But for the projecting pocket the man would have been dashed to pieces on the rocks that lay at the base of the cliff.

Gives Right to Vote.

Judge Hutton, of the Abingdon circuit, has delivered an opinion construing the new constitution on the right to vote of young men who have become twenty-one years old since the assessment of the last poll tax. He holds that by the payment of \$1.50 poll tax to the treasurer they will be entitled to register.

Russia and the Powers.

It is announced that there will be no repetition of the Knight Commander and These incidents. Russia has issued instructions to naval commanders not to sink neutral merchantmen with contraband on board in the future, except in cases of direct necessity, but in cases of emergency to send prizes into neutral ports. "Direct necessity" may be regarded as a reservation of a right which Russia does not formally relinquish, but which, it is safe to say, will not again be exercised during the present war. Russia's concessions in this matter may be looked upon as proof of her sincere desire to avoid international complications or the unnecessary irritation of neutrals.

It is announced in Constantinople that the Russian has notified the Porte of the impending passage through the Dardanelles of some volunteer fleet steamers laden with coal. Russia, it is said, has given assurances that the vessels will preserve the character of merchantmen throughout the voyage.

The London Daily Mail prints a dispatch from Philippopolis, which says that the Porte insists that Russia shall give a written declaration concerning both flag and cargo before permitting to enter fleet vessels to traverse the Dardanelles.
