### ENGLAND INDIGNANT.

The London papers contain a large amount of literature bearing on the great damage to British commercial shipping interests, caused one way or another by Russian cruisers. Numerous letters are published from individuals and companies which are suffering from interruption. They want the government to compel Russia to come quickly to a sensible agreement in regard to contraband and other vexatious questions, or, that being impossible, they want the government to take a stand for itself on some proposition and maintain it with the guns of the British navy, if necessary. Editorial comment is expressed in more guarded terms, but the general tone is apparently sympathetic in this demand. Punch has a cartoon entitled "Mistress of the Sea." It represents Britannia with her trident sitting on the steps of a quay, mournfully contemplating the piles of British goods which await shipment. Neptune is seen in a barge labeled "Neptune & Co., ocean carriers, laden with bales of German goods, just starting for the far East." He says: "You're not sending any of your goods to the far East just now, ma'am; how's that?" Britannia meekly answers, "I'm not allowed to," and father Neptune rejoins: "Not allowed? Why, I thought you had a navy."

The report that the Smolenak is interfering with British commerce off the Cape of Good Hope has caused great indignation in view of the understanding that she would not again be allowed to engage in such operations. There is considerable anxiety for several British steamers now sailing for Japan by the cape route, carrying actual contraband.

The London Times' insurance correspondent says: "One or two steamers with very valuable cargoes are proceeding to the far East via the cape, but it was impossible yesterday to get insurance quotations for anything contraband going the cape route."

The Times, editorially discussing the Comedian incident, says if the Smolenak really was the cruiser which stopped the British steamer, the British people will recall the emphatic promise given in the King's speech that the government would energetically support them in the exercise of their lawful rights as neutrals, and will inquire whether it is not time the navy be instructed to protect these rights, and, if necessary, vindicate them. "We are loath," says the Times, "to even suggest that such measures may be required, but it is absolutely essential to the interests of peace itself that Russia should understand that neither the British government nor the British people will tolerate further equivocation."

### Fight in a Labor Union.

The rule of Philip Weinsheimer, the labor leader, under indictment in New York for extortion, was strongly threatened yesterday at a meeting of the Journeymen Plumbers and Gasfitters' Union, and the assemblage broke up in confusion and a fight. One member was thrown out, and Weinsheimer was told he was using Sam Parks' methods to rule the union. Weinsheimer, who is one of the business agents of the union, presided at the meeting. He censured some of the men for returning to work on a certain building, which figures in the case against him. He said he knew that some of the men were working there, the contractors having induced them to do so. At this a member said to be the boss plumber on the building arose and shouted at Weinsheimer: "We are sick and tired of things you are doing. We are just about ready not to stand any more of it. We have no use for these tactics." Weinsheimer made a heated reply, criticizing the man severely. He then called on the union to put the boss plumber out, which was done. The man, however, collected a number of his friends and returned to the hall. He again shouted at Weinsheimer: "We will have no more of this Parks business from you. If you want to run the union into the ground, go ahead and do it. We will get out." Immediately there was a fight, blows were struck, and some of the men were roughly handled on both sides. The boss plumber, with a number of his followers, members of the union, left the hall and went to the building, where they started work again. By a vote of the representatives of all the unions in the Building Trades Alliance, which had not yet either struck or been locked out, it was decided yesterday that they will join the strike at whatever moment the executive committee of the alliance may call upon them to do so.

### Riotous Farmers.

Fifteen farmers, all of the section known as the Seaside, near Snow Hill, Md., resisted arrest yesterday after they had been regularly summoned to work upon the county roads, as provided in the local law for Worcester county. They also interfered with the arrest of Charles Bratten, who had refused to pay his fine and was being carried to jail. A riot ensued in and around the courthouse. Deputy Sheriff Heathway received rough treatment, and had it not been for the prompt action of Sheriff Lankford and his deputies a more serious affair would have been the result. Bratten is a colored man, and it is supposed he was used as a shield by the white men concerned,

After the riot caused by the arrest of Bratten was under control and he was placed in jail, an attack was made upon Jesse B. Truitt, road supervisor for the "Seaside" district. Truitt was able to take care of himself for a few minutes, knocking down the man who first assaulted him and defending himself with stones until he reached Justice Rounds' office. The man who attacked him was arrested and fined. His uncle and two nephews were placed in jail early in the day. The road in question is one of the worst in the county and it is difficult to get the farmers to work on it.
