### Suicide of Working Men.

While his 12-year-old niece sat at the piano playing "Lead, Kindly Light," his favorite tune, George Vollner, a Brooklyn machine hand, shot himself to death early yesterday. Despondency over his inability to work is ascribed as the cause of the suicide. Vollner was 36 years old. He lived with his brother, Charles Vollner. Two years ago his hand was caught in a machine in the shops where he was employed, and the amputation of three fingers left him maimed and unable to secure work at his trade. Brooding over the injury, he became despondent.

His little niece, Dora, frequently sought to cheer him by playing his favorite airs on the piano. Yesterday Vollner breakfasted with his brother's family as usual, but he appeared especially morose. He went to his room, but returned, asking Dora to play for him.

The girl, with her four-year-old sister, Annie, went to the parlor. She had played half a dozen tunes, when Vollner seated himself on the couch and said: "Play 'Lead, Kindly Light,' Dora. I like that best." As the girl was finishing the air her uncle drew a revolver from his pocket, pointed it at his breast and fired twice. Both shots took effect, and he died almost immediately.

With the last five cents he had Samuel Schotter of New York purchased carbolic acid early yesterday, and committed suicide, while his wife and children struggled to prevent him. Schotter had been out of work so long that he became despondent, and all his wife and children could say or do to cheer him failed to raise his spirits. Schotter was a cigarmaker and was thrifty and industrious, but he said luck was against him.

### Want a Buddhist Kingdom.

It is rather significant that with the success of the British expedition to Tibet and the protest of Russia against the British-Thibetan treaty, some of the Russian papers have suddenly become greatly disturbed over the import of the Buddhist pilgrimage to Mouran in February. According to information which has been drifting eastward from the depths of Mongolia, the agitation for a holy war noted at the time of the pilgrimage to Ourga, in July last, continues. Wandering lamas are spreading the agitation not only among the Buddhists in Mongolia, but among the followers of Buddha in the Altai region of Central China, among the Russian Buriats and even beyond the Siberian borders and in India. According to reports at Ourga there is a general agitation among the Buddhists in favor of freeing themselves from the domination of China, some of them favoring the removal of the Dalai Lama to northern Mongolia and entering on a holy war for the establishment of a Buddhist kingdom, while others advocate appealing for the protection of Russia. What effect the British expedition and the deposition of the Dalai Lama will have on the movement is the subject of much speculation.

The Journal de St. Petersburg says it is very possible that the February pilgrimage may compel Russia to attach serious attention to the situation. "We may expect developments of the greatest importance," the paper adds, "and should be prepared for any eventuality."

### Dynamite on Front Steps.

A neighbor passing the residence of J. C. Maben, president of the Sloss-Sheffield Steel and Iron Company, in Birmingham, Ala., yesterday, saw fire sputtering on the front steps, and, making a hasty examination, found a pickle bottle with a burning fuse attached. The fire was extinguished, and an examination of the bottle showed that it contained a quantity of powdered dynamite, the bottle being sealed with a wooden stopper, through which passed the fuse. There was enough dynamite in the bottle to wreck the building. The man who found the bottle told the police that as he approached the residence he saw a white man run away from the step. A strike of union miners is on at the mines of the Sloss-Sheffield Company, as well as at the mines of several other large corporations in that district. President Maben's company has been active in efforts to break the strike. Mr. Maben stationed guards around his house last night.

### Charge Against Monks.

The official receiver appointed to manage the estate of the Carthusian monks recently expelled from the Grande Chartreuse Monastery in France, has decided to continue to distill the famous liquor. A well known scientist has been commissioned to analyze the liquor, and to inspect and report upon the distilling plant of the monastery. The basis of the liquor is very old cognac brandy, of which large quantities have been found in the distillery since the expulsion of the monks. The official receiver intended to make use of it, but he now hesitates to do so after receiving a letter from the abbot of the Carthusian Order, in which he says that the brandy is his private property, and that before leaving the monastery he "dealt with it as he thought fit." It is supposed that the monks have rendered the brandy unfit for drinking by mixing it with various chemicals. If the official receiver persists in using it very disagreeable results may follow.
