Preparing for Long War.

In addressing the members of the United Clearing House of Tokio yesterday, Count Okuma, the leader of the progressive party, warned the people to prepare for a long war, the date of the termination of which it was now impossible to foretell. He predicted that the cost to Japan for a two-years' war, including the loans which had been already placed and the expenses consequent upon the war at its termination, would total \$1,000,000,000, which would make the per capita share amount to \$20.

Count Okuma said that corruption appeared to pervade the military, political, and financial departments of the Russian government and that this corruption had almost reached a climax which threatened a revolution. It was even reported that Lieut. Gen. Stoessel, now defending Port Arthur, and upon whose shoulders rested the responsibility for the loss of a large share of Russian prestige in east Asia, was guilty of dissipation during the siege. The speaker declared that the weaknesses of the Russians gave the Japanese many victories. He pointed out that despite her defeats Russia continued to hold the prominent and commanding position in Europe, and said that even Emperor William was "currying the favor of the Russian autocrat."

Despite her weaknesses, Count Okuma said Russia possessed immense resources and had tremendous advantages in the size of her population and the greatness of her wealth, and it would be necessary for the Japanese to make heavy sacrifices in order to attain success. He predicted that the war would cost Russia in all \$1,500,000,000 to \$2,000,000,000 and said it would be impossible to raise loans or to increase the taxes in Russia, because the limit had been reached.

The count predicted that it would be necessary for the Japanese government to borrow \$250,000,000 next year, and added that if \$75,000,000 were secured abroad the country must face a depreciation in the value of its securities. Count Okuma urged the nation to carefully husband its strength and resources, and expressed the fullest confidence in the ultimate victory of Japanese arms.

Wife Lashes Her Rival.

Mrs. Rose Heger, a very pretty young woman, of Hoboken, N. J., was a prisoner behind Recorder Stanton Wednesday, charged with horsewhipping Miss Margaret Riemer, a waitress in a restaurant the previous day. Miss Riemer's face was scarred with a deep gash and streaked with abrasions where the whip had fallen. She was also in a highly hysterical condition. Mrs. Heger frankly admitted that she had horsewhipped the young woman, and declared in her defense that the complainant had endeavored to break up her home. She said that Miss Riemer had hypnotized her husband and that when he was in her company he forgot all about his home and his loving wife. "I know that she hypnotizes him," said the prisoner to Recorder Stanton, "because he told me so. He loves me and is happy with me, but when he comes under the eye of this woman he does everything she asks him." The waitress made no attempt to defend herself and was sinking to the floor under the furious lashing she was receiving when the proprietor of the place came to her rescue. Miss Riemer denied in court that she had attempted to alienate the affections of Mr. Heger, and said that she never saw him except when he came into the restaurant. She insisted that the charge made by Mrs. Heger that she had seen her leaving a hotel with Mr. Heger at an early hour in the morning was untrue. The prisoner declared she could bring witnesses to court to corroborate this statement, and Recorder Stanton paroled her until today, when she promised to produce these witnesses before him.

Mass Meeting of Filipinos.

A mass-meeting of Filipinos is to be held Sunday at the National Theater in Manila. The call for the meeting states its purpose to be "to take some definite action upon the popular desire to wit, the giving of our sincere support and sympathy to the American committee on Philippine independence in its efforts to attain the end we desire. It would be inexplicable, and even improper, for Filipinos to fold their arms and remain passive at a time when the very best elements of American society are working ardently in order that our native land may attain its ambition." Fiery orators will speak, the principal one being Sando, a former member of Aguinaldo's cabinet, and who in 1899 signed the order for the massacre of all Americans and other foreigners in Manila. The government will not interfere.

The cable dispatch from Manila stating that the Filipinos would hold an independence mass meeting at Manila next Sunday was shown to Secretary of War Taft yesterday. The Secretary said: "Even though they have what I notice is called 'they orators.'" I am sure that no evil results will follow the meeting. The fact that the government will not interfere with the meeting is pretty good proof of that. I am sure that the meeting will be a peaceable affair, and that no warlike results will ensue."
