

SUNK BY A WHALE.

A remarkable story was narrated yesterday by Capt. Christian Masden, the master of the ill-fated Danish schooner Anna, who arrived in Baltimore on the Johnston liner Quermore, from Liverpool. Captain Masden's vessel was wrecked in mid-ocean September 27, following a collision with a giant whale, the effect of which was to kill the mammoth leviathan and send the Anna to the bottom of the sea.

Captain Masden's vessel, which was a three-masted schooner, was laden with 60 tons of ballast rock, and it was while 22 days out from Patuxent and bound for Campbelltown, N. B., that the collision occurred. There were no passengers on the Danish vessel, which carried a crew of seven, including Captain Masden, all of whom were rescued by Captain Jones, of the Quermore, after drifting helplessly about for three days in the leaking schooner, which threatened every moment to keel over and sink.

The stirring tale of the attack of the big whale, as told by Captain Masden, is as follows: "It was on Tuesday morning, September 27, that the whale struck us, at which time we were 22 days out of Patuxent. It was about 4 o'clock in the afternoon, I think, when we were all horrified to see a mammoth whale rise to the surface just ahead of us. We were proceeding slowly at the time, and before we could tack or make any effort to avoid the leviathan the whale, blowing streams of water 50 feet in the air, bore down upon us.

"The huge animal struck us a glancing blow on the bow, the shock of the collision knocking all of us down. With a tremendous crash the Anna heaved on her side, and when she resumed her normal position four feet of the bow had been carried away and the stern post smashed into splinters. The whale swam along our starboard side, snorting and blowing blasts of water all over the vessel, which rocked like an eggshell in a gale. Within a few moments after the collision, however, the whale rolled on its side, while the water about turned a pale red, presumably from wounds received by the whale in its attack upon our vessel. Blowing, but feebly, the whale continued the struggle to maintain its equilibrium, while every moment but added to the large pools of blood which followed in his wake. The last we saw of him he was swimming slowly and evidently dying.

"The Anna began to fill with water immediately after the attack, and it required the combined efforts of the crew working at the pumps in order to keep her from sinking. We managed to patch up several of the gaping holes in her bow, but it was only by dint of hard work at the pumps that we managed to remain on top of the water until Friday morning, when Captain Jones rescued us. When the party from the Quermore came aboard we ceased work at the pumps, but in the short time elapsing before we quit the Anna the water in her hold had risen an inch or more to every minute. I think she sank, as she must have shipped several tons in the hour after we deserted her. She was still afloat, though, when we passed over the horizon."

Russian War Ships Damaged.

Instead of a sortie of the Russian warships from Port Arthur, it now appears, according to Japanese advices, that four Russian warships were damaged by the fire of Japanese land batteries, one of the vessels being destroyed. Heavy Japanese guns now command every Russian warship in the harbor.

Several sensational reports come from Vladivostok, one to the effect that General Kuropatkin has been very ill and unable to personally command his army since the battle of Liaoyang, and another that the Russians are in communication with Port Arthur by wireless telegraphy.

Lieutenant General Hasegawa goes to Korea to assume command of the Japanese forces there. It is probable that his appointment foreshadows a move to expel the Cossacks now operating in northwestern Korea.

The Russian admiralty continues without news of the reported sea fight off Port Arthur, as well as of the Tokyo report of the wrecking and damaging of Russian warships at Port Arthur by the Japanese land batteries. As a portion of the squadron has been going out occasionally to bombard the Japanese land positions, the possibility that some of the Russian vessels may have been damaged by the Japanese batteries is admitted.

The admiralty officially announces that the Baltic fleet will be ready to sail as soon as the battleship Orei and the cruisers Oleg, Zemotuch, and Izumrud, which sailed from Cronstadt yesterday, arrive at Revel. The ice-breaker Ermak will accompany the fleet.

It is learned from an admiral occupying a high position that the proposition to send the fleet to the far East by way of Cape Horn has been decided in the negative.

The Daily London Telegraph's Chefoo correspondent, cabling under date of October 7 says that the gale is still raging, preventing communication with Port Arthur, and also active operations there.
