### Deaths From Wood Alcohol.

When Herman Sachs died last night in Roosevelt Hospital in New York twenty minutes after he had been admitted, another death was added to the long list which Coroner Scholer believes were caused by the use of wood alcohol in the whisky sold in the saloon of Rudolph Fritsche. There are now sixteen deaths on the list. Sachs was seized with violent abdominal pains yesterday afternoon. Coroner Scholer was notified, and a hurried investigation showed that the stricken man had been drinking whisky bought at Fritsche's saloon just before the police took possession of the place.

Fritsche's saloon in Tenth avenue, which has been guarded by a policeman, since it was closed Monday afternoon, was attacked last night by a mob of a hundred and fifty residents of the neighborhood. They hurled bricks and stones at it, smashing in the door and windows.

The federal government has taken a hand in the investigation of the alleged poisoned whisky case.

Coroner Scholer said yesterday that an examination of the contents of the stomachs of two of the persons who died suddenly under mysterious conditions disclosed traces of wood alcohol. In addition to the local police and to federal authorities, representatives of several insurance companies have begun an investigation of the many recent deaths in this section of the city.

The sixteen alleged victims of poisonous liquor all lived in the vicinity of Tenth avenue and Forty-sixth street, in the neighborhood known as Striders Farms.

All the victims knew one another, and the curious circumstance is that the first fifteen men had attended their friends' funerals until all were dead. Of the fifteen deaths in the eight days four were in one house and two each in three other houses. All were reported to the coroner as "sudden deaths."

### Bride Sues Bridegroom.

A sensational suit was filed in Knoxville, Tenn., yesterday by Mrs. Francis Levering Pfouts Rogers, a bride of two weeks, through her brother, George S. Pfouts, both of Wilkesbarre, Pa., and both wealthy. The defendant to the bill is Joseph Brooks Rogers, a popular society man of Knoxville, whose wedding to Miss Pfouts, September 28, at Wilkesbarre did not become known until the bill was filed in the Chancery Court. The five leading banks of Knoxville are made defendants for the purpose of attaching funds, and John L. Boyd, a brother-in-law of Rogers, is also made defendant. The plaintiff and defendant met at Colorado Spring, and their wedding followed after a short acquaintance. On the morning of the wedding he is alleged to have induced the complainant to give him \$10,000, declaring he would invest \$5,000 in Knoxville with John L. Boyd. She accompanied him to Knoxville, where, she charges, he began to drink heavily. Last Saturday it is charged after converting his own property into cash and purchasing several diamonds, he left, telling friends he would go to Cincinnati, Chicago and the West. The inserted bride, after conferring with relatives of Rogers, filed a bill to recover the \$10,000, but does not seek a divorce.

### Steikers Doing Women's Work.

Faced by lack of work in occupations suited to their dignity, men have made an onslaught on the preserves sacred to the recent importations of women from foreign countries. The Chicago man is willing to act as a maid in order to make a living. Through the many registration bureaus devoted to securing domestic servants hundreds of men are making application to sweep, dust, make beds, clean the cutlery and attend to those other light fantastic trifles that make the stage soubrette so charming as she flicks the chandelier with a duster.

Mrs. A. M. Wadsworth, manager of the Chicago Woman's Guild in the Northwestern University Building, let the secret out a day or two ago. Worse than that, she stated that strikers in the stockyards had come to her in scores during that struggle looking for a chance to take the place of some absentee domestic. Mrs. Wadsworth says the ordinary salary for a manservant is \$30 a month and all found. As the men do not ask for the use of the parlor, have no followers and are not so anxious to get away from work at every opportunity, they are much appreciated. For these reasons the demand for the male article to look after household affairs is on the increase.

### Mad Cows Ram Auto.

Scenting a foe as the big cherry-colored automobile driven by William Bell bore down upon them, a herd of cows charged madly down a road bill upon the menacing "red devil," near Center-ville, N. J., a day or two ago. The auto attempted to evade the impact of the bovine blow, end in doing so butted into a stone fence. Their heads as battering rams, the cows completed the wreck of car and man. Its occupants, two men and two women, were tossed or trampled. All were bruised and cut, but none was seriously injured, as they straightway put the fence between them and the cows.
