#### Damaging Testimony.

George J. Essig, a contracting plumber, on whose complaint District Attorney Jerome brought about the arrest and indictment of Philip Winseimer, the labor leader in New York, gave damaging testimony against the latter at his trial yesterday before Judge Newburger.

Essig made an excellent witness and had a good memory for dates and figures. After telling the jury, at Prosecutor Rand's request, of being awarded the contract in the early part of December for the plumbing work on the Chatsworth apartment house, he said the day following the beginning of actual work his men were called out by Plumbers' Union No. 2. He went to see Winseimer, he said, and the latter told him that Mr. Rendall, who had the plumbing contract before him, was not a member of the Master Plumbers' Association, and that he (Winseimer) had called his men out on strike in consequence of which the owner had awarded the contract.

"Winseimer told me," said Mr. Essig, "that Mr. Rendall's men had not yet been paid their waiting time. I told him I was willing to pay the waiting time and made arrangements to meet him the following day at No. 21 Park Row. We met and I showed Winseimer my contract, and he said, that as far as he could figure out, I was going to make about \$15,000 profit on the job, and unless he got \$3,000 no one could start the job. He said he wanted \$1,000 cash down, and added: 'No Sam Parks business with me. I don't intend to be caught with any checks on me, as he did. The following day I told him I would not pay \$2,250 in cash. Finally he agreed to my plan. On the morning of December 31st, I paid him \$1,000 in cash, and my men went back to work. I also gave him seven notes for \$250 each, payable to through the Hamilton Bank, which I met at monthly intervals. On the night of January 4, I paid representatives of the local Union, No. 4, between \$900 and \$1,000 as waiting time, for Mr. Rendall's men." "Had any of these men done a stroke of work for you," "No," Essig then identified the notes to Winseimer and the court took a recess.

#### A Frightful Accident.

A frightful accident, in which one person lost his life and four others were slightly injured, occurred on the fair grounds at Hagerstown, Md., yesterday afternoon by failure of a brake on the "loop-the-loop" to work. Thomas Goodie, aged forty, of Paterson, N. J., who had been with A. T. Prescott, owner of the "loop-the-loop," for three years, was almost instantly killed. The injured were Roy Bauff, Goodman Walsh, of Hagerstown; Herman Mitsal, and Charles Yessler, of York, Pa. The "loop-the-loop" had just been erected and tested. Two cars, each containing a passenger, were sent around and the mechanism was found to be in good working order. A number of tickets were sold and the four victims of the accident got into the car and successfully circled the loop, which is twenty-five feet in diameter, requiring six seconds to complete the trip from the top to the foot of the incline. When the car reached the brake lever, tried to work it, but it failed to move. The car went thundering by at a speed of thirty miles per hour, crashed into the bumper, jumped into the air, and then fell to the ground, twelve feet below, carrying ten feet of the platform with it. Two of the passengers were hurled out, but the other two were penned beneath the car. The two who were knocked out raised the car and liberated the other two men. Their injuries consisted of cuts, bruises, and nervous shocks. Goodie's head was caught under the car wheel. His skull was crushed, both jaws fractured, and the jugular vein severed. He died ten minutes afterward.

#### \$1,100 For Old Silver Dollar.


The top price at the auction sale of rare and old coins at the Collector's Club in New York yesterday, was \$1,100, which W. F. Dunham, of Chicago, paid for a United States silver dollar supposed to have been minted in 1804. The last appearance of this coin at a public sale was at Philadelphia in 1885, when it was sold to G. D. Dexter for \$1,000. It is one of the 13 1804 dollars recorded on the Nexen list. Its genuineness was questioned by Geoffrey Charlton Adams a month or so ago at a meeting of the Chicago Numismatic Society. Some of the other sales were: Gold—\$20; Morton, 1849, \$150; Clark, Gruber & Co., \$10, 1860, \$138; C. Bechtler, 1834, \$5, \$40; \$3, 1873, \$32.50; quarter eagles (\$2.50), 1796, starless, \$14.50. Silver—Dollar: 1833, \$160. Half-dollars: 1796; \$77; 1797, \$58; cent, 1856 (flying eagle), \$15; half-cent, 1831, \$42; 1836, \$37.50. A little over \$5,000 was realized from the sale.

#### An Attack on Bishop Potter.

During the discussion on the divorce question in the Episcopal Convention in Boston yesterday, Delegate John C. Buxton, of North Carolina, expressed the opinion that persons once married, should be cared to try it a second time. What he thought the church should do, was to help wipe out the saloons founded by certain clergymen, and then the evil of divorce would be greatly reduced.

#### Official.

AN ORDINANCE to grant exclusive permission to Charles F. Thompson and his associates to erect poles and run wires on the streets and alleys of the city of Alexandria for the purpose of furnishing light and power by electricity.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Alexandria, Virginia:

1. That Charles F. Thompson and his associates be and they are hereby authorized to erect poles and run wires over and along the streets and alleys of the city of Alexandria, in order to furnish and supply electric light and power upon the conditions, provisions and limitations hereinafter set forth, and also under those set forth in the various ordinances of the city of Alexandria, so far as applicable and not in conflict with this ordinance and the amendments hereto made, or which may be hereafter made.

2. The Committee on Streets may require the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates to use and occupy the poles already erected by any other person or corporation, or which shall hereafter be erected before the running of wires upon such route, and such route shall be first determined upon by the Committee on Streets and approved by the City Engineer before any poles are erected. All wires run and all work done in pursuance of this ordinance shall be done in a manner satisfactory to the City Engineer.

3. The privilege hereby granted shall continue for thirty years unless sooner forfeited, and upon the termination of the grant hereby made, the plant, as well as the property of the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates in the streets, alleys, or other public places of the city shall thereupon become the property of the city of Alexandria, upon the payment of a fair valuation therefor, but the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates shall be entitled to no compensation by reason of the value of the franchise hereby granted; such compensation, if not agreed upon between the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates more than six months before the termination of such franchise by lapse of time, or within thirty days after the date of the determination by arbitration, or by the arbitrators to be appointed by the City Council of Alexandria, one by the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates and the other (in case of works) upon the payment of compensation either agreed upon as aforesaid or ascertained by the board of arbitrators to be appointed as aforesaid, the plant and property of the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates shall vest absolutely in the city of Alexandria.

4. The City Council of Alexandria expressly reserves the right to impose other reasonable regulations, conditions and requirements upon the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates, and to pass all ordinances necessary to secure the efficiency of public service by the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates at reasonable rates, and to compel the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates to maintain the property of the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates in good order throughout the term of the grant; and it is hereby expressly provided that for a failure to comply with the provisions of this ordinance or such additional regulations, the privileges hereby granted shall be forfeited, and this ordinance may be repealed and the franchise hereby granted declared to be at an end.

5. For any failure to comply with any requirement of this ordinance the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates shall be liable to a fine of not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense, each day's failure to be a separate offense, said fine to be collected as other fines are collected and paid into the city treasury. The imposition of any fine under this section shall not prevent a forfeiture under the foregoing section.

6. That the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates in the equipment of the poles, wires, fixtures as will prevent injury by electrolysis to the water and gas mains and pipes or other public improvements of the city, and will pay to the city all damages to gas mains and pipes occasioned by any person or property growing out of the same cause. And the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates agree and bind themselves to hold the city free and harmless from liability from any and all damages that may occur to any person or persons on account of injury or damage to person or property growing out of the construction, improvement, maintenance, repair or operation of the works and fixtures hereby authorized, and whenever the city is liable therefore and the city shall be sued for such damage either independently or jointly with the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates on account thereof, the said Charles F. Thompson and his associates, upon notice to him by the city will defend the city in such suit, and in the event of a judgment being obtained against the city, either independently or jointly with the said Charles F.
