Mr. Bryan on the Race Issue.

The Philadelphia Saturday Evening Post publishes an article by Hon. William J. Bryan on "Why the Democrats of 1896 and 1900 Should Support Parker and Davis in 1904." He writes in part as follows:
"President Roosevelt is responsible for the prominence of three issues which the people are considering. First, he has done more to embitter the white and black races against each other in the South than any or even all of the Presidents who have occupied the White House since the civil war.
"Whether in insisting upon the appointment of colored officials over the protest of white patrons of the office he has been actuated by a desire to help the colored people or by a desire to make political capital among the colored voters of the North is immaterial. It is certain that he has raised an issue which has thrown the southern States into anxiety and alarm.
"His attempt to override the wishes of the whites in various southern communities has made the entire South fearful that a second term may still further estrange the races and plunge that section of the country into the horrors of a race struggle.
"The entertainment of Booker Washington at the White House has been construed by many as an attempt upon the part of the President to raise the question of social equality, and this has further aggravated the race situation in the South. If the President intended to raise that question with a view of settling it in favor of the black man it means the arousing of a feeling which will seriously interfere with the calm consideration of industrial and economic problems.
"If, on the other hand, the President did not intend to force upon the public the consideration of the question of social equality, it was exceedingly unfortunate that he did anything that could bear that construction.
"The people of the north where the dominance of the white race is not menaced, and where the blacks are comparatively few in number, have no conception of the conditions which prevailed in the south during the period of reconstruction, and it is therefore difficult for them to understand the feeling of the southern people.
"President Roosevelt has not only disturbed the south by the creation of a race issue, but he has offended the sentiment of the entire country by the substitution of a swaggering, warlike spirit for the pacific spirit which has heretofore characterized our national administration. We have had some eminent soldiers in the White House, conspicuous among whom were Washington, Jackson and Grant, but never have we had a President who seemed to take so much delight as does our present President in war and the recital of warlike deeds."

Fatal Leap of Physician.

Suffering from acute nervous disorders Dr. George Purviance, aged 63, of Washington, D. C., climbed out upon a fourth story balcony of the Orthopedic Hospital in Philadelphia, last night, and plunged headfirst, landing with terrible force in a little area below the pavement level. He was instantly killed. One of the nurses of the ward in which Dr. Purviance had been confined ran to the window, when she saw him climbing on the balcony. She reached out and grasped his shoulder, but was herself nearly dragged out of the window by the doctor. Shortly after 6 o'clock last night the nurse saw the doctor leave his bed and walk toward the window.
Upon an overhanging balcony the sick man crawled, paying no attention to the frightened nurse. She ran after him, clutched him, but the demented man grasped her waist and started to climb over the railing with her. The nurse struggled, but the sick man's hold tightened. She shrieked for help, and men and women on the other side of the street screamed, but were helpless. Finally the nurse gave up her hold on Dr. Purviance, used her strength to tear herself away and fell back within the window. Dr. Purviance then lunged downward into space. He struck sideways on the iron railing of the areaway and then fell below. He was dead when picked up. Dr. Purviance was the father of J. Nelson Purviance, of Philadelphia, a high Pennsylvania Railroad official, who recently married Helen Morgan, a young society belle.
On August 8 Dr. Purviance, who had a large practice in Washington, where he lived alone, went to Philadelphia and entered the Orthopedic Hospital to be treated for nervousness. While not entirely irrational, he was closely watched by the hospital authorities.
Dr. Purviance was assistant surgeon general of the Marine Hospital Service. When Dr. Purviance's health first broke down from neurasthenia last summer he went to Baltimore to consult the leading physicians there, and finally went to the Orthopedic Hospital in Philadelphia. Dr. Purviance served during the civil war and was promoted to adjutant general of his regiment and for valorous and gallant service around Vicksburg, where he did most of the hospital service for the highly esteemed

High Heels Were Fatal.

In the morgue in New York is the body of Mrs. Emma Latassa, wife of Canuto Henrique Latassa, a publisher, and dying in Flower Hospital is Mrs. Ova Gauvey, the one having been killed and the other fatally hurt through wearing high-heeled slippers, which caused them to trip and fall five stories from the roof to the ground floor of an apartment house at 153 east Fifty-fourth street. On Wednesday afternoon Mrs. Latassa and Mrs. Gauvey were away from their homes until late in the evening. Late at night Mrs. Gauvey started for her apartments, saying she was going by way of the roof to keep from attracting attention of other tenants in the houses. Mrs. Latassa and she went to the roof together. Their arms were about each other as they started across the roof for the scuttle leading down to Mrs. Gauvey's apartments. Both of them wore abnormally high-heeled slippers. Passing through the scuttle Mrs. Latassa, who was on the side nearest the railing which protected the stairs, caught her heel in the carpet. In trying to recover her balance she pulled Mrs. Gauvey toward the railing, and the two women plunged down the opening between the curved stairways to the stone floor, five flights below. The stairs, which are narrow, make three curves to each flight, and as the women's bodies descended they struck the stair railings many times. Mrs. Latassa was killed instantly. Her back was broken and her skull crushed. Mrs. Gauvey, unconscious and dying, was hurried to Flower Hospital, where it was found that she had a fractured skull and several fractured ribs. There is no chance for her recovery, the doctors say.

Without Saloons or Policemen.

As a result of the vigorous measures taken by the Breathitt county, Ky., grand jury, Jackson is without either saloons or policemen. Circuit Judge Riddle decided that the granting of licenses for saloons was illegal and ordered the saloons closed. The board of trustees has retaliated by dismissing the police force on the ground that without the revenue from saloon licenses it was unable to pay policemen. County Judge James Hargis has come to the relief of the situation by having an extra force of the deputy sheriff's sworn in. Judge Hargis has declared that there shall neither be saloons nor "blind tigers" in Jackson.
