The Dual Murder.

The shooting and killing of two colored men at Ford's camp, in Fairfax county, Sunday night by another colored man and the escape of the latter, were stated in yesterday's Gazette. The men were railroad laborers and became involved in a difficulty over some women which resulted in the dual tragedy.

Today Officers Gill and Nicholson took charge of Edward Lomon, Mamie Shepherd, Eihel Steptoe and Bessie Keys, all colored, who were found in this city, and locked them up as witnesses to the killing. It was then learned that Thomas's victims were Ed. Littman and John Shufout.

It appears that Eihel Steptoe and Mamie Shepherd went from Washington to visit the Keys woman, who is also from Washington. The trio proceeded to Ford's camp where a number of colored men are employed and entered the boarding car. Lomon, the cook, wanted the Steptoe woman to remain in the car, but she made an excuse to leave, promising to return. Mamie Shepherd attempted to leave the car also, but was stopped by Lomon who, it is said, produced a pistol and threatened to shoot her if she carried out her intention.

The woman became frightened and a number of colored men, among whom was Thomas, gathered about the car. Lomon defied the men when they attempted to rescue the woman, and revolvers were drawn. In the melee Littman and Shufout were shot and killed, it is alleged, by Thomas. A fast express train passed at the time, and it is impossible to say how many shots were fired, as the rattle of the train temporarily drowned the noise made by the belligerents. Lomon and the women were turned over to the Fairfax authorities at noon.

Thomas some time ago was arrested in this city by Officer Beach for disorderly conduct on a sleeping car on the Southern Railway. It will be remembered that two negroes, one of whom was Thomas, boarded the train and insisted on being furnished with berths. When the train reached this city the negroes ran and one escaped. Thomas plunged into a house and ran through the kitchen where the family were at breakfast. He was caught by Officer Beach.

A Distressing Case.

The three-year-old daughter of Mr. John Marsh, living on north Pitt street, died yesterday from consumption. A sister of the little one later appeared in a dry goods store in this city and purchased a dress in which to attire the dead child. She remarked, as she laid a dollar on the counter, "that is all the money I possess." Upon being questioned, the girl told the lady who was waiting upon her a pitiful story. A child was buried last Sunday and the death yesterday was the third that has occurred this year.

Dennis Redmond, colored, was assaulted and fatally injured last night near Lincoln, Fairfax county, by another colored man whose name could not be learned. It seems that Redmond's wife went to Philadelphia with the assailant recently and returned last night, and when Redmond met the darkey a fight ensued during which Redmond was beaten unmercifully and cut in several places. The injured man was brought to this city and placed in the Alexandria Hospital where he died at an early hour this morning and his remains were taken to Demaine & Son's undertaking establishment. The assailant fled and is still at large.

Stamping Office.

It is expected that his trial will be held on the fourth Monday in December.

Fearing that her husband would kill the negro, Mrs. Layton would not arouse him, but told Neal he had better leave the premises at once, or he would be shot or lynched, as the son had gone out to summon neighbors. Neal left the house, but was found Sunday in the woods. Deputy Sheriff Brinsfield took him in charge and brought him to Cambridge yesterday. This is the third crime of this character committed in Upper Dorchester within the past few weeks. Neal is a nephew of Peter Collins, who was lodged in jail about 10 days ago on a charge of attempting to assault the young wife of Edward Lyons.
