Lady Yarde-Buller Dead. Lady Yarde-Buller, who made news which was of interest to high society in San Francisco, New York and London, lies dead in her home, in Oakland, Cal. Ten days ago she appeared in court and contracted a cold. Her illness went unchecked, and her waning strength was insufficient to combat the ravages of the disease. Before she became Lady Yarde-Buller she was Mrs. Boyle Blair and before that Miss Leah Kirkham. Her father, General Kirkham, was one of California's wealthy men and occupied a lofty social position. In both her marriages the American girl met unhappiness. Blair died in South Africa and her second husband, the brother of Lord Churston, brought a suit for divorce against Lady Buller. The divorce was granted.

Hon. Walter Yarde-Buller, her husband, was the second son of one of Devonshire's best families. He alleged infidelity, which he was unable to prove, but the wife in her cross-complaint named several women correspondents. The English judge gave credence to her story and dismissed that of the husband. Nevertheless he decreed the divorce. American papers took occasion at that time to speak editorially of the unhappiness of titled marriages and cited the Yarde-Buller case.

During the last years of her life Lady Yarde-Buller was hopelessly insane. In 1899 a guardian was appointed for her person and property. She was sent to a sanitarium, but managed to escape. Two years after that she was again placed in a sanitarium.

Litigation seemed to be the bugbear of her life. Beginning with the divorce suit, she started a string of lawsuits in the courts of London and California for all sorts of purposes. Some of them were to recover money, others to force people to do things they refused to do, and one was against her mother to obtain a greater allowance.

Must Withdraw State Bonds. Secretary Shaw yesterday sent out notices to the 19 national banks having State and municipal bonds in the Treasury to secure public deposits that the same must be withdrawn within 30 days, and that United States bonds, Philippine certificates and Philippine land purchase bonds will be accepted in substitution. The amount of State and municipal bonds now on deposit in the Treasury is about \$1,900,000.
