American Federation of Labor.

The Chicago Federation fight was thrashed out on the floor of the convention in yesterday afternoon's session of the American Federation of Labor, in San Francisco, but after a hot and acrimonious debate lasting two hours and a half the matter was finally referred to the committee on local and federated bodies, with instructions that a report be rendered at the earliest possible moment.

The point of issue rested upon the refusal of the Chicago Federation to comply with the demands of the American Federation to expel two local Chicago unions. The basic principle of the whole dispute rested on a question of trade jurisdiction over the two Chicago unions in question, which were not affiliated with the national body. They were upheld by the executive council of the American Federation of Labor, but the Chicago Federation persisted in disregarding the ruling and allowed two seceding unions to affiliate with the central body. The Chicago Federation was thereupon expelled from the national body until such a time as it saw fit to comply with the edict of the executive council.

The fight on the proposition was the hottest that yet has been waged on the floor. The Chicago delegates stated that the members of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor had refused to permit them to introduce new evidence in the case, and each member of the council in turn took the floor and as decidedly stated that such was not the case. The question, therefore, rested into one of veracity.

The Chicago delegates were desirous of making a motion to the effect that the convention appoint a special committee to journey to Chicago as soon as possible after the final adjournment of the convention and study the situation at first hand. In the interim they desired that William G. Schardt, president of the Chicago Federation, and delegate of that body to the present convention, be seated.

This was designated by the opposition as a mere subterfuge and political trick and was overruled. The debate was finally stopped by a motion carried by a bare majority, setting 4:10 o'clock as a limit after which no speeches on the question could be delivered.

Four Men Asphyxiated.
Four men were asphyxiated by gas at Dover, N. J., yesterday, at the plant of the Dover, Rockaway and Port Oram Gas Company. They constituted the entire working force of the plant and were discovered by George E. Bunnell, a former employe, who on visiting the plant, found it apparently deserted, with engines running under a full head of steam and scarcely any water in the boilers. After shutting down the engines and attending to the boilers, Bunnell went through the works and found the four men beneath an open trapdoor in the meterroom, with the space under the floor filled with gas from a broken valve in the drip pipe. The men lay together in a heap, and Bunnell, noticing that the man on top was alive, entered the trap to rescue him, but became so weakened by the gas that he could not lift the body to the floor, four feet above, and was barely able to get out himself. He staggered outside, but was unable to attract anyone's attention, and it was sometime before he recovered sufficiently to telephone for assistance. When help finally arrived and the gas was turned off, so the men could be taken out, all four were dead. From their positions it is thought that Bulmer went through the trap first to fix the broken valve and was overcome by the gas, and that in an effort to rescue Chamberlain, Eidschum and Gustave followed and lost their lives.

Red Hat Stamped Steers
A stampede of steers, in Louisville, Ky., caused by one of the beasts becoming enraged at a red hat worn by a young woman of Jeffersonville, caused 250 women and girls who had just left the ferryboat to run pell-mell into the ferry dock to avoid being trampled to death a day or two ago. The boat leaving Jeffersonville carried about 250 girls employed in Louisville. They landed and started up the hill, the young woman with the red hat being near the front of the line. She had almost reached the depot when a steer being driven to the ferryboat espied her red hat. With a loud bellow, the animal ducked his head and started for the offending hat. The remainder of the drove of 25 started after the leader. But few men were among the boat's passengers and they, like the women, were too frightened to offer any assistance. The young woman with the red hat had presence of mind enough to jerk her hat off as she ran, and the crowd tore down the hill to the ferry dock with the steers after them. The fugitives tumbled into the enclosure and the gates were closed just in time to prevent the steers reaching them.
