Better Preaching Wanted.

The problem presented by the "decline in church attendance" formed a not very cheering subject for the opening deliberations of the English church congress, but one which undoubtedly merits the most earnest attention of the body which is, perhaps, best fitted by its widely comprehensive character to deal with the question. Rev. A. R. Buckland pointed out that in lesser London, while the population had increased by about 500,000 in the last seven years, the attendance at churches in the same area had fallen by over 100,000. We have no means of judging whether these figures may represent an extreme case, or merely a typical example of what has occurred in other large towns. Even if they stand alone they are sufficiently striking. While many causes must contribute to these deplorable results, and not least the progressive state of the church in a progressive age, we think that Sir Edward Russell was unquestionably right in emphasizing the importance of "competent preaching." We cannot join with Sir Edward in regarding reform in this direction as the "sole remedy" for the declining attendance, but we are convinced that if preaching were generally reduced in quantity and raised in quality a marked increase in the size of congregations would very rapidly ensue.—[Leslie's Weekly.

Land Line to Asia.

Cable and telegraphic communication with Siberia, the Orient, and the Old World countries by way of Bering Strait is proposed by John Rosene, managing director of the Northwestern Siberian Company. He intimates that if the United States government will extend its Nome telegraph line from Nome on to Cape Prince of Wales, and then establish the wireless system across Bering Strait between Cape Prince of Wales and East Cape, the nearest point of the Siberian side, the intervening distance being only from 28 to 35 miles, that the Northwestern Siberian Company will build an overland telegraph line across northeastern Siberia, for the whole of which it holds a concession from the Russian imperial government, to a connection with the telegraph line extending the full length of the Trans-Siberian Railway from Vladivostok to St. Petersburg. This would place, by means of existing cable connection, Japan, China, the Philippines, Korea, Manchuria, another far east countries, as well as all those of the continent of Europe in cable and telegraphic communication with all points on the North and South America continents. It could be done, Mr. Rosene points out, at a much more reasonable telegraph and cable tariff than now obtains.

Five Italians Cremated.

Five Italians perished in a fire that late Wednesday night destroyed the old Noble grain warehouse at Lancaster, Pa. For some time the warehouse has been used by a contractor who is building the Pennsylvania railroad extension through southern Lancaster county. Sixty or more Italian laborers slept in the building. One of them was washing a pair of overalls in a pail of gasoline when a spark from his pipe fell into the pail, causing an explosion that scattered the burning oil. Instantly there was a panic among the Italians, most of whom had been asleep. They fought madly to escape from the burning room. One leaped from a window and was picked up with a broken leg. It is believed that the five who perished were trampled upon in the rush to get out. Their badly charred bodies have been recovered.
