Complaints of Patrons. As was stated in yesterday's Gazette, patrons of the electric railway are again complaining of the unsatisfactory service rendered by the traveling public in the running of trains between this city and Washington.

Police Court. [Justice H. B. Caton, presiding.] The following cases were disposed of this morning:

Harry Phillips, arrested by Officer Knight charged with assaulting Conductor Park of the electric railway, forfeited \$10 collateral by failing to appear.

Benjamin Hughes, colored, arrested by Officers Betts and Hall charged with disorderly conduct, was fined \$2.50.

Kate Hughes, colored, arrested by the same officer on a similar charge, was dismissed.

Wreath for Washington. Carrying out an old custom, Deputy Grand Master of Masons, K. Kemper, representing Alexandria - Washington Lodge of Masons, and Worshipful Master Hirt, of Fredericksburg Lodge, No. 4, today, the anniversary of the death of Washington, went to Mount Vernon and placed wreaths upon the tomb of the illustrious dead.

Forfeited His Collateral. A man, who gave his name as Harvey Phillips, was arrested yesterday evening by Officer Knight on a charge of assaulting Conductor Samuel Park of the electric railway. The latter was in charge of an express train that left Washington about two o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Personal. Captain William M. Jones, Superintendent of the National Cemetery at the Soldiers' Home, in Washington, accompanied by Mrs. Jones, was the guest of Captain J. V. Davis yesterday.

Mr. Jos. S. Beach is quite sick at his home on local Royal street.

LOCAL BREVITIES. The sale of property delinquent for city taxes will take place tomorrow.

The weather was cold and clear again last night. Conditions today, however, have been milder.

A little set-to between two citizens at the corner of Royal and Cameron streets occurred this morning, one of the men being knocked down by the other.

Mr. Jeremiah Evans, of Fremont, Ohio, died on Saturday last. He was 87 years old, and was a brother of Mr. Paul R. Evans, of this city. The deceased visited Alexandria a few years ago.

Officer Smith and Beach found a pair of gumboots and some other stolen articles in the house of a colored man named Washington, in the northwestern part of the city today. They were, it is alleged, stolen from Mrs. M. Laupheimer, and she has identified some of the property.

Fifty-Eighth Congress. Washington, Dec. 14. SENATE. The receipt of the electoral votes of West Virginia and Kentucky were announced.

Mr. Hale reported a list of committee filling vacancies, which was agreed to.

Mr. Oulion, from the committee on foreign relations, favorably reported a bill reorganizing and incorporating the National Red Cross. It was passed.

A messenger of the House, followed by the special committee of five, appointed to impeach Judge Chas. Swayne, of the Northern district of Florida, have entered the chamber and were announced.

President pro tem. Frye, who had been standing during the entire proceeding, at the conclusion of Mr. Palmer's remarks slowly and deliberately announced: "Mr. Chairman and gentlemen of the committee of the House of Representatives: The chair begs to assure you that the Senate will take proper order in the premises, notice of which will be given to the House in due time." He bowed as he concluded. Chairman Palmer and the members of the committee bowed in recognition and, turning, were escorted from the chamber by Sergeant-at-Arms Ransdell, who had preceded them to the bar of the Senate.

HOUSE. Immediately after the reading of the journal in the House today, Speaker Cannon designated the following as the select committee of seven to draw up the articles of impeachment in the case of Judge Charles Swayne: Palmer, Gilbert, Parker, Littlefield and Powers, republicans, and Clayton and DeArmond, democrats.

Mr. Jenkins presented the Baker resolution for an investigation of the steel trust, with the judiciary committee's recommendation that the resolution be tabled.

Mr. Baker ineffectually sought time for discussion of the resolution. The motion to table was carried by a viva voce vote.

The Hill bill to improve currency conditions became the regular order in the House at 2:20 this afternoon. Mr. Hill being absent, the House adjourned.
