NUDE MADMAN ON A TEAR.

With a terrific crash a \$200 plate-glass window in the new Metropolitan Life Insurance Building, at Fourth Avenue and Twenty-third street, New York, was smashed to smithereens early yesterday. A little watchman, who was startled by the crash, saw a vision issue from the shower of flying glass. It was the form of a man, stark naked, wild-eyed and woolly-haired. From an apparently material substance the agent of destruction vanished.

"'Tis a banshee!" gasped the watchman, "and I do now swear I've taken me last."

The crash brought a policeman and a crowd of a hundred. The watchman, when revived, asked anxiously if any other person had seen the destroyer. He took the policeman aside.

"I'm a temperate man, as my friends well know," said he. "I'm not in drink now, but I swear by the name of St. Peter I saw a man wearin' no clothes at all, and he opened the door of a shadow and bounced in."

"Promise me you'll drink no more," said the policeman. "I was the wind that did it."

Bang! went another window. The policeman and watchman trembled in each other's arms, their faces wan, their hair on end. The banshee was before them, with an iron bar upraised. They dived behind a pile of stone.

"Send for a doctor," cried the watchman.

"Make it two," cried the policeman. Reassured by the ensuing quiet they crawled from their hiding place. They found another \$200 window in ruins. They searched in vain for the destroyer.

Policemen Schmacke and Slattery came along. Schmacke said no will-of-the-wisp would smash windows. Slattery was noncommittal. They decided to do sentinal duty.

Directly they saw a woolly head appear from a basement area. The bare shoulders emerged, then the body and legs. The wild man was shoddyly nude; in his hands he carried a crowbar.

While the guardians of the peace awed by the sight, looked on in terror, he began an assault on the windows. One after another they were crashed in.

When the policeman charged on him he swung his crowbar at them and they dodged aside. Another plate glass went to pieces. On down Twenty-third street the destroyer proceeded, smashing windows as he went. When he desisted 19 were in pieces—\$3,800 had gone to bits.

Striking right and left at the policeman, the destroyer fled down Fourth avenue. He perched on the top of a snowpile and invited the policemen to make the acquaintance of his crowbar. He demonstrated beyond any question that he was not a spirit messenger, but a longshoreman gone daft.

"'Tis me that's the king of the castle," he cried in a maddened tone. "Come up, you dirty rascals, till I break your heads."

As the policeman closed in he swung his weapon with murder in his eye. His capture promised to be the cost of life. The police were helpless. They could not shoot. Various ruses were tried, but the madman's cunning frustrated all. Hundreds of men watched the assault. A number of women who had elbowed their way to the front fled precipitately. The shades were drawn in all the nearby houses.

Finally a cabman came bowling along. His quick wit saved the day. As he rode by he flung a blanket over the nude man and in an instant half a dozen policemen were struggling with the king of the snowpile. He was soon subdued and dragged into the subway station, where he awaited the arrival of a Bellevue ambulance.

In the area from which the man had issued the policeman found his clothing. He is evidently a laborer.

A Lucky Investment. With bonds valued at \$80,000 to his credit in a bank, Max Hart, clerk in Postoffice Station L, at One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Lexington avenue, New York, left his home yesterday to attend another rummage sale, for his fortune came to him in an old trunk he purchased for just \$4. Hart was the only bidder for an old trunk when it was put up at auction at a sale of unclaimed packages in an express office, and after it was knocked down to him he thought himself foolish for offering \$4 for it. The trunk was sent to his home, and there in the cellar it was opened. It was old and dusty and was apparently of no value whatever. On top he found ancient newspapers, some worn clothes and a few books of no special value. Then came the brown paper parcel containing 100 bonds of an electric lighting and water company, organized and operating in Georgia. The bonds represent a face value of \$50,000. Hart consulted lawyers, who advised him that as he had bought the bonds in good faith they could not be taken from him. It is supposed that the owner of the bonds died, and his relatives knew nothing about the securities. Hart says that several large brokerage houses had offered \$250 each for the bonds.

Iron Pyrites in Virginia. On the farm of Mr. T. C. Dickinson, near Midlock, in the Green Springs district of Louisa county, a vein of iron pyrites was discovered some little time back, after having sunk a shaft forty feet deep. It has proved very encouraging, far exceeding the prospectors' expectations. The vein widens as they go

down, and it is thought these mines will prove as valuable as those at Mineral. They have also found a magnificent ledge of building stone and preparations are now being made by capitalists who have become interested to mine and quarry on a large scale early in the spring, when it is thought the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad would run a spur out to the mines.

Must Support Two Wives. E. L. Mills, of McKees Rocks, Pa., according to a decree handed down by the Superior Court, will be compelled to support two wives. The one, Emma Vaughn, his commonlaw wife, sued for support after Mills had deserted her and married another woman. The Allegheny County Court ordered him to support her and the higher court sustained the lower court.
