**STRIKES IN RUSSIA AND PRUSSIA.**  
A curious method for terminating the Russo-Japanese war was initiated at a meeting in Barcelona, Spain, yesterday. Delegates representing 106 labor and other societies telegraphed to the international anti-militarist committee of Holland demanding that a general strike be proclaimed in all countries with the object of ending hostilities in the far East.  
A dispatch from St. Petersburg says that twelve thousand men at the Putiloff Iron Works struck yesterday. The strike is the result of the refusal of the manager to reinstate four workmen who were dismissed for belonging to a union and to discharge a foreman on demands formulated by the union, which represents 20 industries. The workmen have further resolved that unless their demands are conceded the men in three other works will join in a sympathetic strike. There is a possibility of a great extension of the movement.  
While, as previously stated, the strike is the outgrowth of the question as to recognition of the union, the socialists are trying to seize the opportunity for the organization of sympathetic strikes in other industries in St. Petersburg, with the object of creating an anti-government demonstration.  
The union originally was organized by M. Soubaloff, under the direction of the late Minister of the Interior von Plehve, in order to combat the socialistic democrats; but the latter are now in control of the union and are using the government's instrument for their own purposes. A priest is the ostensible leader of the union, which is composed of six circles and has a membership of 5,000.  
The Putiloff Iron Works are executing large government orders for small arms, rapid-fire cannon and locomotives, which fact probably will induce the authorities to make every effort for an adjustment of the difficulties between the workmen and their employers.  
The socialist democrats have called a meeting for January 19, at which it is expected resolutions will be passed in favor of an advanced socialistic programme.  
A dispatch from Berlin says that the Emperor while dining with Commerce Minister Moller Friday, talked over with him the swift spread of the strike, which already embraced nearly 100,000 men, and the certainty that German industry would be tremendously affected should 300,000 men quit work, as threatened. The Emperor said it was the duty of the government to bring its judgment and authority to bear on the mineowners and on the miners.  
Herr Moller on Saturday and during Sunday communicated with the mineowners and obtained their consent to yield on some points of the men's demands, although they remained firm on others. The Minister intimated that it was the Emperor's wish to see the strike settled, and certain mineowners on Sunday afternoon opened negotiations with the strike leaders.  
Delegates representing a large part of the disaffected miners decided at a meeting in Berlin yesterday afternoon on a general strike, regardless of partial concessions offered by the mineowners. The miners' leaders, among whom the report was circulated that the Emperor and the government were anxious to settle the strike, were not affected thereby. They aver that the strike can only be settled by justice. The socialists control the miners' action.

**Curious Freak of Young Woman.**  
Robert McFetridge, a young man whose home is in Norfolk, Va., was arrested in Philadelphia on Saturday by Detectives Lindner and Alexander on a warrant charging him with stealing jewelry from Anna Critchfield, of Norfolk. He was committed to prison to await requisition papers. About an hour after his arrest, Miss Critchfield appeared at the Detective Bureau with Lawyer Rosenfeld and admitted that she had no charge to make against the young man. She wanted him released at once, and even offered to pawn her jewels to obtain bail for him. After the Chief of Police of Norfolk was communicated with McFetridge was released and he and Miss Critchfield returned to Norfolk on Saturday night. The young woman said that she and McFetridge had been quite friendly for a long time. Last Wednesday he and she quarreled, and he started for Philadelphia, vowing that he would never return. In order to get him back to Norfolk Miss Critchfield made a false charge of larceny against him, and the police of Philadelphia were asked to arrest him. She admitted to Captain of Detectives Donaghy that McFetridge did not steal anything from her.
