GERMANY IN MOROCCO.

Chancellor von Buelow, speaking in Morocco in the German Reichstag yesterday, said that "Germany would in the first instance place herself in communication with the Sultan of Morocco."

Germany had such interests in Morocco as other trading countries, such interests as she had in China and other parts of the world. These interests were real and would be protected in Morocco according to the open-door principle.

Herr Rebel, the socialist leader, had raised the Morocco question by criticizing the government for taking diplomatic action to safeguard German opportunities in Morocco long after the Franco-British agreement, when it should have acted a year ago.

Chancellor von Buelow said that, although the moment was not politically opportune to discuss Germany's relations with Morocco, he would say that Emperor William had declared more than a year ago to the King of Spain that Germany had no selfish aims against the territorial integrity or independence of Morocco. The Emperor's visit to Morocco had no aggressive purpose, but, apart from the independence of Morocco and apart from the Emperor's visit, German economic interests remained to be protected, and they would be. Those interests were considerable.

The Sued-Deutsch Reichs-Korrespondenz, regarded as voicing Chancellor von Buelow's views, says Emperor William's "continues her relations with the sovereign of Morocco, and does not and will not give up such relations to France, which seeks to exercise a controlling influence in Morocco."

A dispatch from Paris says:—Chancellor von Buelow's speech in the Reichstag yesterday on the subject of Germany's attitude toward Morocco is likely to exert a strong influence on the Moroccan situation. The general view prevails that the Chancellor's language, while moderate and dignified, nevertheless discloses Germany's purpose not to recognize the Anglo-French agreement giving France a paramount position in Morocco. The Chancellor's allusion to maintaining the open door without limit evidently was directed against the 30 year limit of the agreement. The reference to maintaining the Sultan's sovereignty in Germany's desiring directly with the Sultan also is likely to arouse feeling, not because France has an opposite policy, but because the declaration, coincident with Emperor William's visit, gives rather assertive prominence to Germany's expectation concerning a country in which France is deeply interested.

BULL ON THE RAMPAGE.

Angered at the sight of a crimson spring gown, a big bull being led by the Schwartzschild & Sulzberger plant in New York for slaughter, went on a rampage along Broadway yesterday afternoon. The enraged animal chased women into stores and up stairways, drove a doctor up an elevated pillar, scattered pedestrians right and left along Thirty-fourth street, threw ferry passengers into a panic and, plunging into the East river, swam, pursued by a boat, to a rock in the middle of the river. There, monarch of all he surveyed, he chased off packing-house employees who tried to capture him, and was the cynosure of thousands of eyes.

The bull, fat and sleek, looked innocent enough as he was led along, blinking at the trolley cars. Mrs. H. W. Carter, a sister of Miss Ella Rader, the woman financial genius, who undertook to finance Santo Domingo, was passing wearing a new red spring gown. The bull looked at the gown with rage and fire in his eyes. Then, stopping suddenly, he lowered his head and charged. With a shriek, Mrs. Carter ran for a doorway and leaped up a flight of stairs faster than she ever climbed before. The bull ran to the foot of the stairs, stopped, turned around and glared at Dr. Edward Wallace Lee and a companion. Someone in the street hit at him with a cane, and his temper not improved, the animal charged at Dr. Lee. The physician ran to an elevated railroad pillar, which he started to circle, ring-around-the-rosy fashion, the bull in pursuit. Unable to bring the physician down, the bull, burning with desire for the freedom he had known on the western plains, ran from Eighth avenue and Forty-fourth street to Broadway, down Broadway to Forty-second street, from Grand Central Station to Third avenue and Thirty-fifth street, and east to the river. Men, women and children fled at his approach. People rushed out of stores and looked in amazement. A great crowd, led by a squad of policemen and small boys followed on his trail, but all were unable to keep up, and those with ropes got no chance to use them. Before the crowd had a chance to cheer the bull made one rush. A second later the would-be cow-boys turned and dived into the river. Teaching their boat, they rowed away for life. The packing-house employees later returned and succeeded in capturing the bull. They got him into a boat after hard work, and landed him on Blackwells Island.
