GOOD ROADS AGAIN.

The Virginia Good Roads Association, which was formed at a convention held in Danville on January 31st, elected a temporary bureau, consisting of one member from each congressional district of the State to take charge of the "good roads" improvement and to conduct a campaign of education and organization throughout the Commonwealth.

This bureau was duly organized at Richmond on the 14th day of February and elected Mr. W. N. Ruffin, of Danville, chairman; Mr. A. P. Bipp, of Charlottesville, recording secretary, and Mr. J. S. Oliver, of Danville, treasurer and assistant secretary. It most respectfully and hopefully solicits the aid and cooperation of the press and all good citizens throughout Virginia in behalf of this great factor in our material, industrial and social development.

The first district is represented by Mr. Henry Warden, of Fredericksburg; the second district by Hon. Robt. Withers, of Suffolk; the third district by Col. W. M. Cary, of Richmond; the fourth district by Hon. Chas. T. Lassiter, of Petersburg; the fifth district by Mr. W. N. Ruffin, of Danville; the sixth district by Mr. R. S. Barbour, of South Boston; the seventh district by Mr. A. P. Bipp, of Charlottesville; the eighth district by Mr. J. T. Wampler, of Culpeper; the ninth district by Mr. B. E. Watson, of Pulaski; the tenth district by Judge J. O. Shepherd, of Palmyra, constitute a body of representative men who have the interest of their State at heart in this potent and potential work.

As this bureau is merely temporary and was appointed for the sole purpose of organizing the "good roads" movement throughout the State, it is their purpose to call a convention (composed of delegates from each club in the State) just as soon as the number of clubs warrant it, not later, it is hoped, than July 1st, so that the people may elect a permanent bureau of their own choosing in the place of the temporary bureau.

It is proposed to organize all clubs in the State on the same basis and under the same forms, copies of which will be sent on application to your district representative, or to the head office in Danville. Good citizens in every section of the State are requested to secure these forms and proceed to organize clubs.

The Virginia Good Roads Association advocates federal aid and State aid in the employment of jail and penitentiary convicts, and the appointment of a State highway commission.

As funds will be necessary to further this movement in a proper and prompt manner, contributions will be solicited all over the State, and in addition, each club member will be expected to contribute \$1.00 as annual membership dues. The bureau treasurer is bonded for \$5,000 and his accounts will be audited by a competent committee every thirty days, so there need be no fear that contributions will be properly accounted for and judiciously expended.

It is recommended that the clubs as formed write our Senators and Representatives in Congress, urging them to advocate federal aid for permanent "good roads." The public roads, especially since the adoption of the rural free delivery, should have the same claim on the United States treasury as the rivers and harbors, upon which the government spends so many millions every year.

In addition to soliciting the aid of the press throughout the State the bureau has determined to publish monthly a "good roads" paper devoted exclusively to the interest of this movement in Virginia and to send this paper to each member of every "good roads club" in the State, commencing as soon as the club membership reaches 1,000. It is thought that such a paper will be valuable as an educational factor on the "good roads" question, and as a means of communication between the clubs in the various counties of the State.

This is a patriotic movement for the upbuilding of the State and will contribute to the happiness and prosperity of all of her citizens.

Supposed Corpse Sat Up.
The remarkable revival of a victim of spinal meningitis who had been supposed dead and over whom the undertaker was about to perform his functions is exciting Sheepshead Bay, N. Y.

Two weeks ago Benjamin Rader, the son of Morris Rader, living on the Shore road, Sheepshead Bay, was taken ill with meningitis. Last Thursday the lad, to all outward appearances, died and an undertaker was summoned. When he arrived he was sent away and a Jewish undertaker summoned, the people being Hebrews.

As the second undertaker arrived the mother of the lad fainted away and the windows were opened in an attempt to revive her. The rush of cold air had a remarkable effect on the supposed corpse, who sat up and asked for a drink of water.

Another physician was summoned and the treatment resumed. The lad, however died Tuesday night.
