FOUR MEN KILLED.

As a result of the bloody battle at Hempstead, Texas, Monday night, four men were killed and others were wounded. Hempstead was last night under the control of the Texas Rangers. Martial law has not been declared; but Adjutant General Hulen arrived last night with a number of Rangers and assumed charge of affairs. No one is permitted to bear arms and the excitement manifested throughout the day had quieted down last night.

Rollan Brown, the son of one of the men killed at the prohibition mass-meeting Monday night, was yesterday placed under arrest on a charge of firing the shot which killed Representative John M. Pinckney. He stated that his father was under the influence of intoxicants when he attended the meeting, and that he (the son) attempted to dissuade him from attending. His father was firm, however, in his intention, and went to the meeting. The son followed and took part in the shooting. It has been established that the trouble began when Captain Brown attempted to secure recognition to speak at the meeting. It is said that his language was offensive to several ladies present, and the fusillade began immediately afterward. Congressman Pinckney was shot four times, and almost instantly killed. Thomas Pinckney, a brother of the congressman, was shot twice in the back and killed, and Captain Brown received a bullet through the heart. John E. Mills, the remaining victim, who took no part in the affair, was killed by a stray bullet.

The killing are the direct result of a prohibition movement in Waller county, which began some years ago, and the feeling has been intense. An election was held in Waller county April 20, and the prohibitionists, with whom the Pinckneys were affiliated, were successful. The Prohibition League was called together Monday night to wind up its affairs and disband. A resolution requesting the Governor of Texas to send troops to Waller county for the purpose of enforcing the law against liquor-sellers was excitedly debated. It was at this juncture that Capt. H. M. Brown, who had figured prominently as an anti-prohibitionist, sought to have the chairman recognize him. Yesterday it was reported that friends and relatives of the participants in the bloody affray had been asked to come to Hempstead, and it was feared that further trouble would result. Last night, however, cooler counsel had prevailed and the little town is quiet. While no further trouble is anticipated, a number of Rangers will remain at Hempstead to preserve law and order should the occasion arise.

Indorsed by State Federation of Labor

In the discussion of the Virginia gubernatorial campaign considerable doubt has been expressed as to which candidate would receive the indorsement and support of the railroad employes of Old Dominion, who are well organized and wield no little influence. It has been said that Lieut.-Gov. Joseph E. Willard would not receive the united support of the railroad element, on the ground that he refused to vote, while a member of the State Legislature, for the employes' liability, or fellow-servant, bill unless the law were made applicable to all citizens in hazardous employment. Friends of Mr. Willard, in Washington, declared yesterday that he had already received the indorsement of the railroad men and that they would give him their loyal support. It is claimed by these friends of Mr. Willard that when he was elected Lieutenant-Governor and presiding officer of the State Senate and found that the employers' liability bill would not be passed with the amendment which he offered, he withdrew his objections and gave the measure, as originally drawn, his hearty support. It was pointed out that after the passage of the bill the Virginia Federation of Labor, at its annual meeting at Roanoke, in May, 1902, expressed cordial appreciation of Mr. Willard's services in behalf of the bill.

Fire in New York

Five alarms were sent in for a fire on the East Side in New York last night calling all fire apparatus from the Battery to Twenty-fifth street. The buildings destroyed were those that for years were occupied by the Kidleys as a dry goods store, and a familiar landmark on the East Side, bounded by Grand, Allen and Orchard streets. The buildings were occupied by furniture dealers and manufacturers of cotton underwear on the upper floors, while the ground floor was occupied by the Van Norden Trust Company, a Hebrew loan society and the Hebrew Charity Aid Association. The flames burst through the roof a hundred feet into the air, and made a most spectacular fire, but they were soon quenched by the numerous streams played upon them being confined to three buildings. The loss is \$200,000. The fire broke out from an unknown cause shortly after 5 o'clock, just as several hundred employes were leaving the buildings, but no casualties were reported. So great was the outburst of smoke and flames that much excitement was caused in the downtown section. While the fire was at its height in the building of the Van Norden Trust Company a squad of police was summoned to the Mutual Alliance Trust Company, opposite, and \$70,000 in cash, under police escort, was removed to the branch of the Corn Exchange Bank, several blocks away.
