STRIKE DISORDERS.

With 1,350 teamsters on strike last night, with constant accessions to their number and with the express determination of the Employers' Association to take a firm stand for the "open shop" and to fight the teamsters' union to the bitter end, Chicago to all appearances stood on the eve of one of the greatest industrial upheavals in her history.

There was rioting in various parts of the city yesterday, despite the strong guards of policemen and the numbers of private detectives hired by the Employers' Association to protect their wagons.

The declaration made last night by members of the Employers' Association that it would probably discharge any teamsters who refused to haul goods to or from Montgomery Ward & Co. brought out the teamsters in many downtown mercantile houses during the day, and the number, it was expected, would be increased largely by tomorrow.

While the labor leaders were conference yesterday delegates of the Chicago Employers' Association, the Commercial Exchange and representatives of outside industrial organizations met at the Union League and declared that they would fight to the last ditch for the "open shop" in Chicago.

At the close of the meeting the following authorized statement was made: "The employers are of one mind. They are determined to have this city made an 'open shop.' They are tired of standing for slavery such as we have endured from labor unions in the past.

The employers pay the men for a day's work, and if the men fail to do it they will be discharged. They cannot tell us with whom we shall or shall not do business. We are not making any fight against the unions as such, but the unions of Chicago are evidently determined to run the business of every merchant in the city, and we are going to show them that they cannot and will not be allowed to do it. We are ready to defend our interests against any fight that the teamsters and the Chicago Federation of Labor may put up."

Subscriptions were taken during the day to strengthen the Employers' Teaming Company, the weapon with which the Teamsters' Union is to be fought, and last night President Mark Morton, of the company, who is a brother of Paul Morton, secretary of the navy, had \$1,000,000 at his disposal and had ample assurances from business men that he could have as many times the amount as was necessary.
