THE CHICAGO STRIKE.

For the first time in Chicago since the strike of the American Railway Union in 1894 the government of the United States has been made a party to labor troubles. The government was brought into the teamsters' strike yesterday by the issuance of an injunction by Judge C. C. Kohnsaat, of the United States Circuit Court. The writ was asked in behalf of the Employers' Teaming Association on the grounds that the organization is incorporated under the laws of West Virginia and is therefore under the protection of the Federal Court.

The federal order demands that all the defendants refrain from any interference with the business of the Employers' Teaming Association and commands the strikers to refrain from picketing, massing in streets with intent to interfere with the wagons of the complainant and from interfering in any manner with non-union men in its employ.

As soon as issued the injunction was printed on large cards and two of these were attached to every wagon of the Employers' Teaming Association. The injunction exerted a pacifying influence and there was less rioting in the streets than Thursday. A heavy thunderstorm during the latter part of the afternoon and the evening also lent material assistance in keeping the thoroughfare clear.

Twelve arrests were made for interference with the injunction, all of them being made at one time and place.

At 1:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon two wagons, with coal, approached the Union League Club, in Jackson Boulevard, and when they attempted to drive into a narrow alley east of the clubhouse were attacked by strike sympathizers. A lively fight resulted. The wagons were plainly marked with copies of the injunction and the police, in charging the crowd, arrested 12 strikers, who are now confined in Harrison Street Police Station.

One hundred and five copies of the injunction were given to United States Marshal Ames for service on labor leaders, and five deputy marshals were sent out immediately to serve them. Most of the notices had been served by evening.

When news of the injunction reached President Shea, of the Teamsters' Union, he issued the following order, signed by the committee of teamsters' business agents:

"To All Union Teamsters: Permit no violation of the peace under any circumstances. Competent drivers cannot be procured to handle the teams in Chicago and violence will not help us in this strike. Be loyal to your union and obey its instructions."

The injunction writ is made returnable May 10, and the defendants will have a hearing on that day.

The strike spread steadily throughout the day. Most of the teamsters going out were those employed by small concerns. There are now about 3,500 teamsters on strike and their inaction has largely deprived about 15,000 other men of work.

It was impossible yesterday to have a package delivered to any address outside of the downtown business quarter from any of the large dry goods stores.

President Shea, of the Teamsters' Union, and President Dold, of the Chicago Federation of Labor, made efforts to secure conferences with the four brotherhoods of railway employees, but nothing has developed along this line.

It is not probable, however, that any spread of the strike will be made in any direction outside of the Teamsters' Union until tomorrow, when all the organizations to which appeal has been made by the teamsters will hold meetings.

Three persons were injured during the street fighting yesterday.

Steady progress has been reported by the Employers' Teaming Association in securing men to take the places of the strikers, and it is predicted by the employers that before many days they will have their business back to a normal basis.

The full meaning of the strike was brought home to the public yesterday. Boycott against "struck" firms was rigidly enforced, and conditions, extraordinary even in a strike, developed. Grocery, coal, ice and meat were kept away from the firms involved. Even florists, except those delivering for funerals, were affected.

The hay, grain and feed drivers took action, shutting off the feed from all barns were strikes are on. Hundreds of horses stabled in the barns are threatened with starvation.

Railway express companies and their patrons were especially hampered. At the headquarters of the Railway Express Wagon Drivers' Union hundreds of requests were received by telephone and by business men in person, asking that permission be given to make shipments, and complaints were made that their business was injured and money lost.

One restaurant keeper begged that he be allowed to receive a shipment of bread that had been started from Milwaukee Thursday night. The request was refused, and a strike threatened against the restaurant if the bread was taken out of the express company's office, because the shipment was made after the strike had been called.
