A BOGUS QUEEN.

A woman who claimed to be Carlotta, the wife of Maximilian, former Emperor of Mexico and brother of Francis Joseph, present Emperor of Austria, has, according to the Boston Herald, left that city after securing some \$40,000 from members of the Italian colony on the pretense that she was rightful claimant of the Austrian throne.

"She is," the Herald says, "being sought by over 100 residents of the north end district, who for almost eight years have been paying her money to enable her, as they supposed, to gain possession of the Austrian throne, upon which event taking place she promised that they and nobles and been given vast estates. One woman, the wife of a prominent Italian, gave her \$5,000 on the strength of the promise that she should be made a duchess. An organ grinder contributed a few hundred dollars, all his savings, on the understanding that he should be made court musician. Others contributed tens and hundreds on similar assurances.

"Many Italian residents secretly visited her at her royal headquarters, a handsomely furnished room in a dwelling house on the corner of two South End streets, where the pseudo-queen sat on an imposing throne, resplendent in red cloth and tinsel, and graciously allowed them to kiss her hand on the occasions on which they brought her tributes of money. At each side of the throne stood couriers and a bodyguard who clanked stage arms.

"Mysterious secrets such as would overthrow the present Austrian ruler were credited to this woman. When she appeared in Boston eight years ago, it was whispered among the few in the North End that Carlotta, sister-in-law of Emperor Francis Joseph, was in Boston in disguise, having escaped from Brussels, where she had for many years been confined in an asylum.

"Italians are fairly familiar with Austrian history and when they were told that Carlotta had come to Boston to collect a few faithful followers on whom she could rely, and enough money to return to Austria and use in connection with her all powerful secrets, and that those who aided her would back, when she gained the throne, in her royal favor, they believed their fortunes were made.

"Charlotte's aids in this vast enterprise were a number of select and dashing young men of various nationalities, among whom was one, Moriarity, who represented himself to be the crown prince Rudolph, the eldest son of Emperor Joseph, who in January, 1889, shot himself.

"Recently the Italians were getting rather suspicious and began to hint openly that Carlotta and the henchmen were jangling matters. Recent visits to the throne room disclosed that the woman had left."

Mysterious Figure of a Woman.

The mysterious figure of a woman bearing a striking resemblance to the pictures of the Virgin Mary, and believed by many to be an apparition, has been appearing nightly in the center of a circle of light high up on the side wall of the house of Thomas Morris, on Hicks street, near the corner of Morris in Philadelphia. During the last three nights upward of 3,000 persons, from all parts of the city, among them the alling and crippled, who came with the hope of being cured, assembled to watch the strange object. The incredulous devout nattered prayers, the incredulous giggled and laughed. But none was over boisterous. Spirituists declared it to be a genuine shade and the practical denounced it as a rick. But all agreed on the strong and unmistakable likeness to the Virgin. The police have endeavored to keep the matter quiet so as not to augment the crowds and attendant excitement. On Friday night the throng was so great that six policemen were sent out to disperse the crowds, which trailed out into Morris street blocking the trolley cars. Fearing that his store windows would be crushed in, Samuel McFaul, who keeps a grocery store on the corner, was obliged to close the store.

Billion in Church Treasures.

The Minister of Worship, M. Bienvenu Martin, recently sent a circular letter to all the prefects of the French provinces, ordering that an inventory of all the precious works of arts in possession of the French churches be carefully made. The returns obtained were simply amazing, as they show that the artistic patrimony of the church in France is valued at \$800,000,000 not including the statuary, altars, architectural ornaments and stained glass windows, which would make the total value more than \$1,000,000,000.

One of the most precious church treasures in France is that called the treasure of Conques, in the Department of Aveyron, which was on view at the exhibition of 1900 and which includes the most precious enamels, reliquaries of great antiquity, sold silver and gold statues.

If it had not been that the National Assembly in 1791 had ordered the melting of many similar precious objects of art, the value of church treasures in France at the present day would be almost double. As it is the case in Italy, all artistic articles in France will remain the inalienable property of the State.
