

CONFEDERATE GENERALS.

Maj. Robert W. Hunter, secretary of military records for Virginia, has compiled a list of the surviving Confederate generals, giving their seniority as far as possible.

There are fifty-seven generals living today, while during the war not less than 500 were commissioned. This includes lieutenant generals, major generals and brigadier generals. Interest in the question has been awakened by the death of Gen. Fitz Lee.

Maj. Hunter spent some time in going over the records, visiting Washington in order that he might have access to the records in the office of Gen. Marcus J. Wright. The list, with rank, place from which appointment was made and place of residence at this time, are as follows:

In connection with the foregoing some reference to the work now being done by Maj. Hunter will be of interest. He is collecting an immense amount of data connected with the civil war—papers, documents, orders, muster rolls, discharges, transfers, details for duty and much else that will go to make up history. It may be that some of the records will conflict with the titles of the "colonels" and others who have figured since the war, and the service rendered by some—as claimed—may receive a shock, but all the same, the work is of incalculable value.

Maj. Hunter spends a considerable part of his time in correspondence with parties who have knowledge of the existence of old muster rolls and often much time is consumed in getting into communication with the owners of these papers.

Attempted Murder and Suicide.
Because eighteen-year-old Louise Kremer would not marry him, Frank Huber, of Plainfield, N. J., put a bullet in her head at an early hour yesterday morning, and then, unwilling to live alone, he put two bullets in his own brain, which prove fatal. The girl is now in Muhlberg Hospital at Plainfield. She has slight chance for recovery.

Huber was a machinist, forty-one years old. Until recently he had been employed at the Walter Scott Printing Press Works. Several months ago his fellow-workman, Charles Kremer, agreed to take him as a boarder at his home in Fanwood. There he met the daughter. From the very first Huber evinced a decided liking for the young woman, but to her he was a staid old man, and there were many young men in the neighborhood who were vastly more attractive. Huber pushed his attentions so far that they became distasteful to the girl and she told him so. Then Huber began to covet.

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The climax came yesterday morning. After meditating over his supposed wrongs, Huber arose at the conclusion of a sleepless night and did not even wait for breakfast to carry out his plans. Louise was preparing for a day's outing
