DEMANDS OF MUTINEERS.

A dispatch from Theodosia, Crimea,
says: Summoned by the Kniaz Potemkin
representatives of the town council
went on board the battleship and
were received in the admiral's cabin by
the commission commanding her.

The commission demanded the deliv-
ery of 500 tons of coal and provisions
of various kinds within twenty-four
hours, and threatened that in the event
of noncompliance after due warning to
the inhabitants the town would be bom-
barded.

The commission also proposed that the
mayor should transmit to the population
a proclamation demanding the termina-
tion of the war, a convocation of zemst-
vos, &c.

Learning of these demands many in-
habitants fled the town. The workmen
insisted that the demands be granted.

A special meeting of the municipal
council was called and the council con-
sented to deliver the provisions, but re-
fused to comply with the demand for
coal for the reason that the town had
none.

The mutineers yesterday formally
raised the standard of rebellion and is-
sued the following declaration:
"The crew of the Kniaz Potemkin
notify the foreign powers that the deci-
sive struggle has begun against the
Russian government. We consider it to
be our duty to declare that we guarantee
the complete inviolability of foreign
ships navigating the Black Sea, as well
as the inviolability of foreign ports."

A dispatch from St. Petersburg dated
at 2:15 this morning says that while no
official confirmation is obtainable it is
confidently asserted that the admiralty
has received news that the Kniaz Po-
temkin, after shipping coal, provisions,
and medicine, is again at large in the
Black Sea, and that her destination is
unknown.

Whether the report of the sailing of
the battleship be true or not, the crew
took a remarkable step yesterday, when,
with all the solemnity of a provisional
government, it issued a manifesto ad-
dressed to the powers announcing that
civil war had begun against the
existing regime in Russia, and pledged
the inviolability of foreign shipping and
foreign ports.

This action doubtless was taken to
quiet the apprehension of foreign powers
and to leave no excuse for the sending
of warships through the Dardanelles to
effect the capture of the battleship,
which until now Russia's Black Sea fleet
has not dared to attempt. It is con-
sidered a shrewd move on the part of
the mutineers, and strips the comman-
der of the crew as a leader far above the
class of the ordinary sailor, and strength-
ens the opinion that he is not a mem-
ber of the original crew, but one of the
revolutionaries who went on board at
Odessa.

The issuance of the manifesto lends a
certain dignity to the mutiny, and proves
that the crew and their commander have
no desire that the world should believe
them to be mere outlaws, but that they
should be looked upon as men seriously
raising the standard of revolution.

According to a rumor the ship's strong
box contained \$375,000, and the mutineers
would therefore be well supplied
with money.

In circles closely in touch with the
revolutionists it is regarded as a fore-
gone conclusion that the commander of
the Kniaz Potemkin, knowing the situa-
tion in the Caucasus will head for Poti
or Batoum, where the revolutionists are
exceedingly strong, in the hope of pro-
ducing a general rising. With the authori-
ties in the Caucasus almost powerless to
prevent it, such a contingency is by no
means impossible.

Killed by Explosion.

By an explosion in the Tidewater
coal mine, at Vivian, twenty-two miles
west of Bluefield, W. Va., yesterday,
nine miners, all of whom were Italians,
were injured, and two of them died later
in the hospital, while three more are in
a precarious condition, with slight
chance of recovery. All of the men were
burned badly.

The explosion occurred about 8:30
o'clock yesterday morning. The men
had just begun entering the mine, and
those injured represented all that were
in the mines at the time of the explosion.
They were rescued with but little diffi-
culty.

Mine officials assert that the ex-
plosion was caused by a very heavy
shock in operation, and that dust ignited.
The Tidewater mine, however, is below
the Elkwater river bed, and outsiders
familiar with the mine doubt the dust-
ignition theory.

Storms in Europe.

Serious damage was caused in Milan,
Italy, by a severe storm which resulted
in the killing of one person and the
injuring of thirty. Dozens of trees were
uprooted, telegraph wires broken, and
the railroad service greatly interrupted.
The statue of St. Vitellio on the famous
cathedral was thrown from its niche.
The walls of the cathedral were threat-
ened and the crypt flooded. Great dam-
age was caused in the suburbs, especially
at Musocco, where five persons
were killed and many injured, seven
fatally.

Thunderstorms with gales of unusual
violence accompanied by hailstorms,
visited northern and central France yes-
terday. Two men were killed at An-
gers, where enormous damage was done
to the crops. Near Orleans eighty
houses were razed and many persons
were injured. In the environs of Lyons
and Chambery the crops were ruined.

Attacked by Negroes.

J. R. Turner, a well-known young
man of Newport News was terribly
beaten and probably fatally injured by a
crowd of negroes on the Bay Shore branch
of the Newport News and Old Point
Railway early yesterday morning. Turn-
er was returning to the city from Buck-
roo Beach, where a great crowd of peo-
ple from all parts of the Peninsula had
gathered to spend the Fourth. By mis-
take, the young man boarded the Bay
Shore car, which carries negroes to what
is known as "Negro Buckroo." He quar-
reled with a negro and was attacked by
a crowd of the latter's companions. One
of the negroes used a razor, and Turner
was badly cut about the arms and legs.
He was then thrown from the car to the
ground, where he lay until he was pick-
ed up by employes of the railway com-
pany. He is now in Dixie Hospital,
Hampton, in a critical condition.
