Fined Five Dollars.

Bernard Scott, colored, who was arrested in Baltimore late Thursday night at the instigation of Engineer Robert Jones, of the steamer Jane Mosely, and charged with attempting to blow up the steamer, was fined \$5 and costs yesterday afternoon by Justice Leake, at the Southern police station. Mr. Jones testified that Scott was standing at the rail of the engine-room presumably peering into the hold out of curiosity. Suddenly, as he turned his back to give his attention to another portion of the machinery, he said he heard a sharp, crackling noise, and upon turning discovered Scott hastily drawing his hand from the cylinder of the engine. Observing that the exhaust valve had been removed, and cognizant of the fact that it could not have been removed by the jarring of the boat or by the throbbing of the huge boilers, Mr. Jones said that he was confident the negro was responsible for the act. The valve, he said, weighed in the neighborhood of 300 pounds, and it would have been an utter impossibility for it to have been removed from the hook without the most precise caution. Had the temporarily disabled machinery been allowed to exist for any lengthy period, something would necessarily have had to give way, and it was only by the prompt action of the crew that a catastrophe was averted. Scott testified that he had been drinking and had descended to the lower deck in order to wash his hands. While passing the engine-room he said that he had stopped merely out of curiosity to observe how the machinery worked when under a high pressure. While leaning on the rail he said his arm slipped and he slightly pitched forward, his hand falling on the machinery. It was at this juncture, he said, that the engineer turned and saw his hand resting on the boiler. It was purely an accident, he remarked and could not have been avoided under the circumstances.

Police Court.

A white man, arrested by Officers Patterson, Mayhugh and Bell charged with permitting gambling on his premises, forfeited \$20 collateral by failing to appear.

The Collector's Office.

It was recently stated in the Gazette that the last effort made by Congressman Sleep and Collector Summers to have the United States Internal Revenue office removed from Alexandria to Abingdon was such a failure that another such effort would not soon be made. It is now said that the government building at Abingdon is entirely unfitted for the revenue office and that if the office should be moved from the present commodious and well arranged building in Alexandria, all three floors of the Abingdon building would have to be used for the accommodation of the business of the office.

The Health of the City.

There are several cases of typhoid fever in Alexandria, but no more than usual at this season of the year. In fact cases exist in all cities at all times during the year. The authorities are busily engaged in cleaning the streets of the city, while the Alexandria Water Company has been flushing their mains and directing attention to the reservoirs. A few days ago the water bore an unpleasant taste, but by prompt action it has been eliminated. In the meantime it behooves householders to see that sanitary conditions exist in and about their premises.

Death of Mr. Beach.

Mr. James W. Beach, an old and well-known resident of the First ward, died at his home on south Fairfax street at noon today. The deceased leaves a widow and six children. He had for some time been a sufferer from heart trouble. Mr. Beach was a tinner by trade and for many years was employed in the shops of the Southern Railway in this city.
